

BAWDESWELL HEATH

Many of the new Residents in the area may not as yet know about Bawdeswell Heath, a very delightful piece of ground on the right side of the Dereham Road, past the Post Office.

For many years it has been a Trust with a Management Committee, and the proceeds of the sale of timber, mostly for pit-props, is devoted to the welfare of the older people in the village, or to help those in special need. In addition, local residents are entitled to gather dead wood for kindling or for burning.

People are very welcome to walk on the Heath, though they are specially asked not to damage the trees; and they are welcome, if they come by car, to put these off the road, but are specially asked not to take them further than the drain which runs across. There is ample parking space on the road side of the drain.

Unfortunately for some time past, a number of drivers have gone further in, and also there have been motor cycles, scrambling within the confines of the area. These are dangerous, as they might easily harm small children and others: and they are particularly asked to abide by the rules, and not to ride on the Heath itself.

This area belongs to the community, and it is up to the members of the community to preserve it and its facilities for its own benefit.
