

Time is on our side this time so lets make this a combines villages outing !!

The mild weather over the past couple of weeks has given me the chance to get around and do a few jobs that should have been done before Christmas when we had Don't be fooled into thinking that the the snow. Winter is over because we often get some very cold weather in February and March. If you still have a part of the garden not yet dug, turn it over now and leave it rough, the frost will break it up, and with a sprinkle of lime at the end of the month you will get a fine tilth for sowing in March. I've had an excellent crop of Peer Gynt brussel sprouts so that is the sort to grow this year. If you are after giant onions get some seed started on the kitchen windowsill and prick out as soon as the tops straighten out. Plant some broadbeans in seed trays in the greenhouse, shed or garage but bring them into the light as soon as they are through. If you are troubled with mice get some ALPHAKIL from the chemist put it down at night and collect up the dead mice in the morning.

Seed potatoes are in the shops now so get some of your favourite kinds and set in trays to chit, keep away from the frost. Don't be in too much of a hurry to plant early peas, end of the month is soon enough, but you can start your parsnip seeds, mixed with sand in a warm cupboard, when they have chitted put in a cool place for a couple of weeks before planting.

If you didn't get any spring cabbage plants in we still have some, come and see me at weekends. Don't forget shallots and onion sets can be planted now, they are quite hardy and won't be affected by the frost.

Dormant fuchsias and pelargoniums can be trimmed back and started into growth if you have a little warmth in the greenhouse on cold nights, open the windows on fine days and spray with Benlate or other fungicide to combat mildew.

If you haven't sprayed the fruit trees yet make the effort this weekend, and it is not too late to plant a few raspberry canes or a fruit tree or two, or how about a flowering cherry for the front garden there's still

time. If we do get snow wrap yourselves up warmly and knock the snow off branches and shrubs in the garden and don't forget snow can damage conifers in a very short time by the sheer weight it imposes upon them.

LAMINGTONS.

Ingredients:- For 12 portions.

6 ozs Margarine. 6 ozs Castor Sugar. 3 Medium Eggs. 6 ozs S.R. Flour.

7 ozs Icing Sugar. 1 oz Cocoa Powder.

6 ozs Desiccated Coconut 3 Tblsp.B oiling Water.

1 Oblong Cake tin (7" x 11" approx)

Method.

Cream the margarine and the sugar (castor)until soft and light. Whisk the eggs well and gradually beat into the mixture, adding a little seived flour if it shows signs of curdling. Lastly fold in the flour, pour sponge mixture into greased and lined cake tin. Bake at 350F for 20 minutes. When cold cut into 12 squares.

Place the seived icing sugar and cocoa powder in a bowl. Pour the boiling water over, slowly, stir with a wooden spoon, gradually working in the icing sugar and cocoa powder. Keep the icing thin by standing it over hot water. Put a square of the sponge on a fork and dip into the chocolate icing, allow and excess icing to drip off. Toss the squares of sponge in the desiccated coconut and when covered allow to set standing on a wire cooling tray.
