

New Year - New Hopes - New Faith ?

Well, once again it's time to write an article for a new year nazagine edition. In many ways I feel that there's a kind of artificial division that we place in our minds about a 'new year'. After all morning follows the previous night, just like any other day of the year - but perhaps that reflects upbringing in a family that didn't bother to 'see the new year in' - Val and I still don't !

When we look at the Bible we find things said about the God that we worship that also reflect a changness and a constancy, e.g. 'I am Alpha and Omega, and First and the Last, the Beginning and the End.', (Revelation 22.13) and 'Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today and forever' (Hebrew 13:8) to name but two quotations. In a world that is constantly changing, and at a rate that has never been experienced by the human race before, those of us with a faith, like to cling on to the fact that there is a One who is Unchanging and Enduring.

But at the same time, the changes in the world happen and do affect us, whether we like it or not: sometimes for good 'im sometimes for bad. My Grandmother at 95 - born before the invention of the motor car, (she remembers the first one coming to her village in Suffolk), enjoys Television: having constant hot water: and heat readily available at the flick of a switch. I doubt though that she relishes the thought that she could be blasted out of existence and the rest of us with her at the touch of a button.

There is however, a coming together of my two strands of thought - in that although God is constant - constant love, constnat goodness, constant judge - He constantly seeks to change and renew us. (Behold I make all things New' (Revelation 21:5). The process begins when the Holy Spirit starts to work in a person - very often he or she is unaware of any such a happening.. then cones the point of conversion (and there is no true Christian Faith without conversion from the ways of the world and towards the ways of the Lord). St Paul expressed the result of conversion in this way... Therefore, it anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation; the old has gone, the new is come'. A further result is a new joy, almost inexpressible and indescribable to those who have not experience it; new love, new attitudes, that only God can give. The Psalmist expressed his joy in the Lord in words like 'Sing to the Lord a new Song, for he has done marvellous things'. Px 98 and 'Clap your hands, all you mations shout to God with cries of joy' Ps 47.

So which way are you going to go this year ? Are you going to allow the changes of this world to drag you under ? Or are you going to frust in the constant love of God as revealed in Jesus and let him make a new creation of you, and give you new joy, strength, vitality, come what may. Jesus said, 'I have told you these things, so that in me you may have peace. In this world you will have troulbe. But take heart! K have overcome the world' (John 16:33)



Their progress has been remarkable - t'is well for the future. The afternoon finished with the traditional Nativity Play.


Uncle Mall had the children crying with laughter at the Childrens Party. School year ended with a surprise visit from Father Christmas.

Bawdeswell Parish Council

The much looked forward break from council meeting during December, alas came to an abrupt end, due to the receipt of another planning application, and a meeting was held on Monday 20th. Items covered were:-

1 Planning 3/82/2423 A.Haynes. Reepham Road. Garage extension P.C. observation: This will tidy up the end of the dwelling which had been left for an intended extension.

3/82/3497 Mr R. Dewing. Adjoining Post Office. Renewal of Erection of three dwellings. P.C. Observation: No objection to this renewal of prewious application.

3/82/3544 Mrs O. Adams. Reepham Road.

Alterations and extension.

P.C. Observation. No objection to this improvement to the dwelling.

3/82/3614 Mrs J. Hatfield.Part o.s. 109, Reepham Road. Erection of one dwelling.

P.C. Observation:- Residents find it necessary to be guided out onto this dangerious stretch of road, due to lack of visibility. Until road widening improvements are implemented it is not considered a suitable site for a new dwelling in this area.

Bus Shelters

Estimates for laying concrete bases for the two shelters have been received but one more is awaited, and then the lowest tender will be accepted, and on early progress, subject to weather conditions will take place.

Street Lighting

It was reported that Mrs Tavender wanted to know why the Parish was without Street lighting and that it the Parish Council were not interested in this matter, whe intended doing something about it herself.

The Parish Cogncil would like to remind parishioners that this matter was thoroughly investigated, and finally in May 1976 at an A.G.M. with the cost for village lighting at a figure of £3675 it was unanimously rejected. That was the result of three years inter department investigating, planning, and interviews between Eastern Electrictly, N.C.C., B.D.C. andour parish council.
