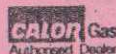

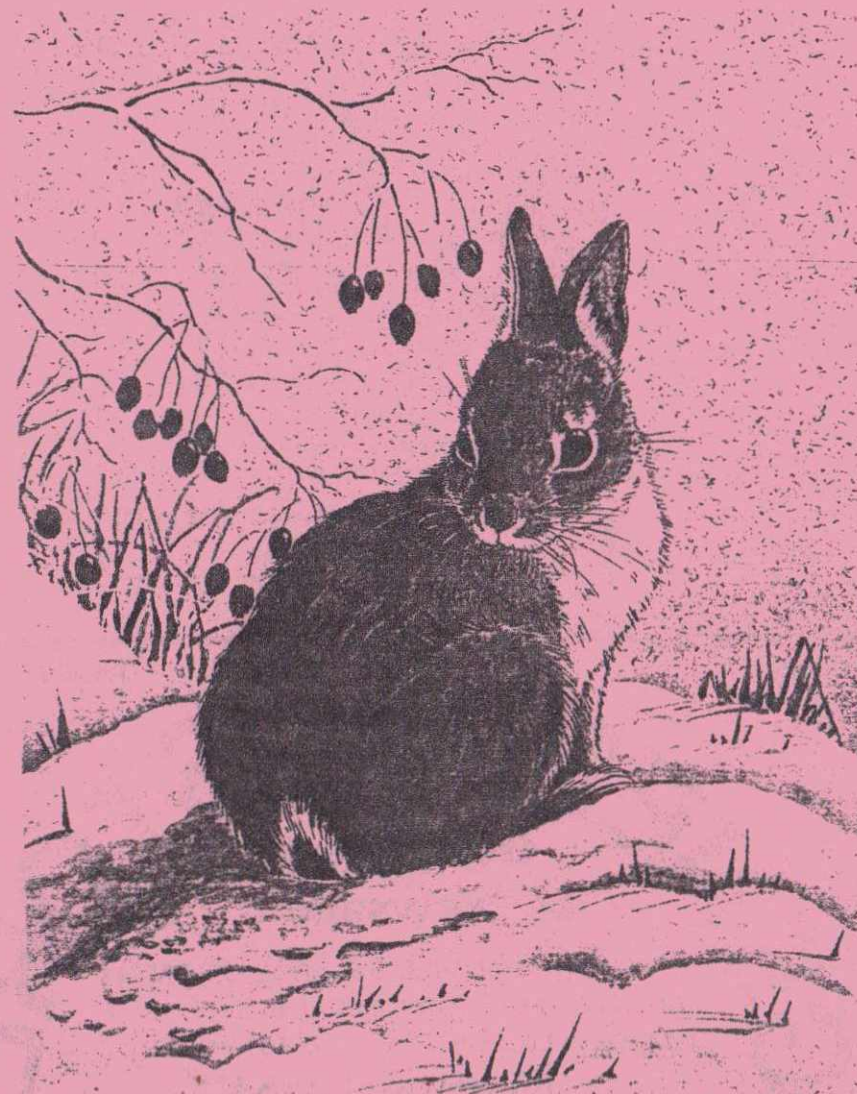

MINUTES OF FOXLEY PARISH COUNCIL MEETING held on Monday, 16th November, 1987, at 8p.m. in the Village Hall.

Present All Councillors plus 5 Parishioners.

Minutes of Previous Meeting taken as read agreed and signed.

MATTERS ARISING

VILLAGE HALL - Chairman stated we have no reason now to stage as the bowls mat fits perfectly.

HIGHWAY SIGNS - We are to have a second Foxley West sign denoting double entry to that part of Foxley. Village Hall signs can be erected at Parish Council's own cost. Two signs will be required, Mr Cook proposed seconded by Mrs Joice. Clerk to contact Highway Dept. regarding the location.

FOUL DRAINAGE - Chairman stated that this will be dealt with in two sections. Existing and Extension. Mr Chapman, Anglian Water Engineer, who introduced the scheme to Parish Council on June 22nd, 1987, met Mr Murrell at the Surveyors Land on Friday, November, 13th 1987. Anglian Water are interested in using part of this land to house the pump. We are unable to sell any of this land but we could lease part. Electricity Supply will be brought in at A.W.s cost. Cameras will be used to track down problems in existing drain. Tests will be carried out to discover if existing drains are suitable, all traps to be examined to eliminate odours. The new rising main from Foxley Street to Bawdeswell will be capable of taking the load of any possible extension. Inspection and cleaning work to start in the near future - manholes, pumping station and rising main in New Year. Some residents in the Street have contacted Anglian Water independantly. They are asked to channel their enquiries through the Parish Council. Mr Cook noted that A.W. have fallen behind their time schedule.

QUESTIONNAIRE RESULTS - Only 21 forms returned - of these - 10 in favour in the Street and 5 in favour in West Foxley. Because of poor response to questionnaire, the question now is "Do we still pursue an extension to the system". Since our last meeting, not much progress has been made. We still press Mr Ryder to let us know if he will interpret section 16 of the 1973 Water Act, to date he has failed to come up with the answer. Parish Council are unanimous in agreeing, after getting so far we pursue the matter.

VILLAGE SIGN - (ORNAMENTAL) Chairman contacted Miss J Webdale and two designs have been drawn by her. Another artist has also been approached and in due course will submit.

VILLAGE SEAT - 21 replies to questionnaire, 50% in favour of junction near Street.

SURVEYORS LAND - Two adverts were inserted in Dereham and Fakenham Times, 4 replies received - all of which drew blanks. Clerk wrote to N.C.C. Countryside Section and a Mr Scowans met Chairman on site. We now await a report on Conservation proposals from them. Once again Mr Cook stated he would be willing to take the land for a nominal fee to keep it in a natural state.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH SCHEME - Information has been received from Kings Lynn (Inspector Jordan) with various stickers and pamphlets. Clerk to contact Police to arrange a meeting for Monday, January 18th, 1988 at 8p.m. at the Village Hall.

NORFOLK SOCIETY - Should we become members of this, it was unanimously agreed we should.

BAWDESWELL RECREATION FACILITIES - Clerk to inquire which rec/fac are on offer? Does one have to become a member to participate? At the moment we are committed to improving our own Village Hall.

PARISH CLERKS SALARY - Chairman pointed out that Clerks salary should be at a minimum of £3 per week as per Norfolk Association guidelines. Also the employing of a Village Caretaker to be discussed.

STORM DAMAGE TO TREES - Breckland District Council are asking for information on the damage to trees in Foxley & Foxley West. Councillors will survey their own area and report to Parish Clerk for collation. Grant Aid may be available.

ANY OTHER BUSINESS - Mr Cook noted the sale of a plot of land in West Foxley. The land has Agricultural Restriction. Planning permission was given for purely Agricultural Land with House. Clerk to contact agent to ask "Has the land been sold and are they aware of the Agricultural Restriction." Clerk to look out previous application.

AVAILABILITY OF CHURCH KEY - Mr Cook would like knowledge of the whereabouts of the Church Key.

DONATION - P.C. agreed unanimously, £10 to Citizens Advice Bureau.

BAWDESWELL PARISH COUNCIL

Minutes of meeting held Monday, 2nd November in the Village Hall.

Present: Councillors Ward, Sparkes, Eglinton, Farthing, Neil and Wright and 2 parishioners.

Apologies: Councillor Smith.

Minutes of previous meeting taken as read and agreed.

Finances: It was agreed to pay the Auditors fees of £27.83 including VAT.

Citizens Advice Bureau requested support for next year; it was agreed to give support, the amount to be decided at a later date.

The Norfolk Society Campaign for the Countryside requested support; the council decided that they are not in a position to contribute.

Councillor Sparkes stated that the sum of £189.94 (plus £10 donation) had been raised from the recent Jumble Sale. A vote of thanks was put forward for Councillor Farthing.

Recreation Ground:

1. Councillor Ward stated that he had discussed the layout of the Recreation Ground with the District Recreation Officer; his suggestions are expected in the near future.

Councillor Neil said that he had received complaints of vehicles going on the ground at night times. Mike Elsdon offered to donate 2 gates and Councillor Eglinton the necessary posts. Phillip Cook offered his services to help with their erection, which Councillor Ward offered to organise.

2. Councillor Sparkes presented a Draft Recreation Constitution that he had drawn up. This was agreed in principle that this was suitable, although Councillor Ward did not agree. It was agreed that this could be amended at future meetings. The constitution will be passed to the Recreation Committee to comply with.

Planning:

1. Erection of one 5 bedroom house in place of two 4 bedroom houses on plots 2 and 3, Reepham Road - no objections.

2. A letter had been received from Breckland District Council, who asked the council views on the outlined development areas in Bawdeswell.

The council are opposed to a link road between Paradise Road

and Hall Road, due to the roads not being suitable for increased traffic.

No objections to the development of the poultry land.

3. Street numbers to Church Close - no objections.

Any Other Business:

1. Councillor Neil stated that he had received complaints of untidiness on the ground next to the Recreation Ground entrance, the owners are to be contacted with regard to this.

2. Councillor Neil stated that stock cars were being kept on the land near Chaucer Close; this has now been cleared and can only be used for agricultural purposes.

3. It was agreed that the spare land near Mr. Underwood's can be used as a car park as long as it is kept in reasonable condition.

4. It was stated that the BottleBank should arrive in the near future.

5. It was stated that the post near Adams Pit is broken; this will be brought to the attention of the County Highways.

6. A letter had been received from Breckland District Council with the entry in Breckland Guide; this was agreed.

7. It was stated that the Chief Engineer at N.C.C. had been to look at the condition of The Street. He agreed to press for increased drainage.

8. It was stated that Mr. & Mrs. Robinson of Church Farm had been unable to see the revised plans to the Barn Conversion on Black Horse Meadow; it was agreed that they should contact the Parish Clerk, to view her copy.

9. A special thankyou to Elizabeth Barrett for her work as Parish Clerk.

FOXLEY - SOME HISTORICAL NOTES

Place name: from Old English fox-leah, 'fox-wood'. Leah has two senses:- 1. 'open place in wood, part in wood with trees scattered so that grass can grow'. 2. wood or grove.

In Foxley either sense could be the original meaning.

FOXLEY - SOME HISTORICAL NOTES (Cont'd)

In Domesday Book (1086) Foxley occurs in the lands of Count Alan, one of William the Conqueror's barons.

'Godric holds Foxle which Lord, a free man, held in the time of King Edward (Edward the Confessor, died 1066). Now Alan holds it and Godric from him. Three carucates of land (= ploughlands), then as now 10 villeins (heads of peasant tenant families), and three of these dwell in Bec (Beck); and 21 bordars (= smallholders), and 2 of these dwell in Billington; then (i.e. 1066), 2 serfs, then as now 3 plough teams on the demesne (i.e. the lord's farm), and then 5 plough-teams belonging to the men, afterwards and now 3, and 3 acres of meadow; wood for 300 swine. When he took it over 2 rounceys (horses), now 1, now 14 beasts (prob. cattle). Then 30 swine, now 22; then 40 sheep, now 100; then 60 goats, now none; then 5 hives of bees, now 7. And 2 sokemen (= a kind of freeman) in the same town, and in Baldereswella 12, and they have 43 acres of land; then as now 2½ plough-teams; woodland for 10 swine. Then it was worth 100 shillings, afterwards 8 pounds, now 10 pounds; it is 1 league in length and half a league in breadth, and pays 8 pence and a halfpenny towards the king's tax'.

In 1334 Foxley was taxed at £3.15s.8d, slightly below average for Eynsford Hundred, but on a par with Bawdeswell, Elsing, Ringland, Brandeston, and Haveringland.

In 1603 there were 60 communicants of the church, which would give a total population of around 100.

In 1801 there were 187 inhabitants; the peak was reached with 321 in 1851, and thereafter it declined to 187 in 1901.

Manor

Granted by Henry II to Sir William de Munchensy, whose family held it till the last quarter of the 13th century, when it passed by marriage first to the de Vere family, and then by the death of the Earl of Oxford to Aymer de Valence, Earl of Pembroke. After his death and the death of his widow it went to his sister who married John Hastings, Lord Abergavenny, who later took the title of the Earl of Pembroke. On the death of the last John Hastings in 1390 it passed to the collateral branch in the person of Reginald,

FOXLEY - SOME HISTORICAL NOTES (cont'd)

Lord Grey of Ruthyn, with whose family it remained until about 1520 when it was sold by Richard, Earl of Kent, with Bawdeswell and Sparham, to Sir Charles Somerset, natural son on Henry Beaufort Duke of Somerset. Sir Charles was created Earl of Worcester by Henry VIII, to whom he was Lord chamberlain. After 1560 it passed from his family to Sir William Cordell of Long Melford, who was Speaker of the House of Commons, a Privy Councillor, and Master of the Rolls in the time of Queen Mary Tudor. After his death it went eventually to his sister, who married Richard Allington of Horseheath, Cambs. On her death in 1603 it went to her daughter Mary who married Sir John Savage of Clifton, Chesh. It was sold by his grandson Earl Rivers to Sir Ralph Winwood of Ditton Park, Bucks. In 1700 it came via Alexander Pitfield to Edward Lombe of Weston.

The Lombe family was founded by Sir Thomas Lombe, an alderman of London, who is said to have gone in disguise to Italy and stolen a model of a silk throwing machine, for which Parliament in 1732 voted him £14,000. Thomas' brother John built the first silk mill at Derby in 1726. Edward Lombe was his first cousin. Edward's daughter Mary married John Hase of Dereham and Great Melton; their son took the name Lombe in 1762, and was made a baronet in 1783. Sir John died unmarried in 1817; his title went to his great nephew Sir Richard Paul Jodrell, and his estates to his nephew the Revd. Henry Lombe of Bylaugh.

Foxley Wood

1274 claim of free warren, i.e. hunting rights.

1390 grant to the king's servant John Lowyk of the keepership of the park (i.e. deer-park) and wood of Foxley, in the king's hand because of the death of the Earl of Pembroke, and the following year a grant to the same John Lowyk of the same on condition 'that of the said underwood sufficient cover be reserved for the king's deer within the park, that he suitably inclose at his own expense, from time to time, the coppices whereof he takes the underwood, and that the underwood is taken in season'.
