

It has been my privilege just recently to share with my Methodist friends in the 250th Anniversary celebrations of the conversions of John and Charles Wesley. Their dedication and zeal in proclaiming the good news of Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord still shines as an example of what God can do in and through the lives of ordinary people.

I was grateful to Cyril Jolly of Gressenhall for some interesting facts and anecdotes he supplied when I was researching for an article to be included in the Radio Times. Not all the news from the 1730s was good. Unfortunately, the spread of Methodism was not greeted with great enthusiasm by other Christian groups in Norfolk. In particular Cyril told me, one of the early Methodist tabernacles (or chapels) in Timberhill, Norwich, was virtually destroyed through civil disorder led by other Christians.

Thankfully the tide has turned and all over the country we see a closer working together of Christians from different traditions. One of the significant unifying factors in all this has been the hymns left behind by Charles Wesley. I'm sure many of your personal favourites came from his pen - Love Divine all loves excelling; O for a thousand tongues to sing; Jesu, lover of my soul; Forth in thy name O Lord I go - and many, many more.

In a month that sees Foxley Chapel celebrate its own and its Sunday School's Anniversary, may we all continue to work and pray for an ever deepening unity amongst God's people ".... till in heaven we take our place, till we cast our crowns before thee, lost in wonder love and praise."


FOXLEY PLANNING APPLICATIONS.

W. & J. de Favilland, Turnpike Farm, Foxley - Erection of three dwellings on land fronting Old Fakenham Road, West Foxley. Majority of Parish Councillors disagreed on grounds of infill - access from Foxley West to the A1067 a very dangerous stretch and the attractive entrance to Foxley West will be spoilt.

D. J. Smith - Lyng, 9 Peath Road. Frection of one single storey dwelling at "Fairfield", Chapel Poad, Foxley West. Parish Councillors have no objection to one single storey dwelling, the plot is not crammed compared with other plots in the area or previous infill in The Street.

PLANNING APPROVAL WAS NOT GRANTED for removal of agricultural restriction Pobin Fill, Mill Road, Foxley West. For conversion to bed & breakfast accommodation and Granny Annexe Pol-Na-Chess, Mill Road, Foxley West.

PLANNING PERMISSION WAS GRANTED for the restoration and conversion of redundant barn to dwelling, Mr & Mrs J. Venworth, Fairfield, Mill Road, Foxley West. For demolition of barn and erection of dwelling for disabled person, Mr & Mrs Fletcher, Street Farm, The Street, Foxley.

MINUTES OF THE A.G.M., HELD IN THE VILLAGE HALL on Thursday, 5th May, 1988.

ELECTION OF OFFICIALS.

CHAIRMAN. Councillor Sparkes was proposed, seconded and unanimously elected Chairman. VICF CUAIPMAN. Councillor Farthing was proposed, seconded and unanimously elected Vice Chairman.

GENERAL DISCUSSION.

The fencing near Adams Pitt had still not been repaired, thus allowing vehicles to cross over the A1067, cars were also going through the field gate. The Chairman stated that the matter had been referred to the Highways Department. Parishioners are reminded that the fence and the gate are there to stop vehicles using this route across the A1067 and into the village.

Flooding on Dereham Road near the Feath entrance and on the street to be referred to the Highways Department again.

MINUTES OF PREVIOUS A.G.M.

Taken as read, agreed and signed. Matters arising; Nil.

FINANCE.

Having received the Precept, the Councils overdraft currently stands at £25.37.

FINANCE (cont'd). So far approximately f.600 has been raised by the 200 Club fund raising. The first draw will take place at the 50/50 Auction on the 21st May.

The Chairman presented the years Accounts. Councillor Holmes raised the point that they did not include the interest free loans still outstanding. Councillor Smith stated that these amounted to f780 and it was agreed that they would be included in future.

PLANNING.

- 1. Mr. Dawson, Park House, Reepham Road proposed extension. No observations.
- 2. P. Bennett, Chaucer Close 3 garages planning permission refused.
- 3. Planning permission granted for the following applications:-Leal Dev. Blackhorse Meadow - demolition of barn, replacing with new building. Jarvis, Norwich Boad - Extension. Harris, Hall Poad - Fxtension.
- 4. Roger Bros, land at Hall Road erection of 31 dwellings. Although Roger Bros had agreed to leave a play area, the District Council Recreation Committee had decided that it would be too expensive to maintain and as the village already had a playing field there were no grounds for appeal. The council agreed that if the expense of maintenance was the only reason for turning down the offer of the play area, it was prepared to meet the cost, especially as the current sports field is some distance from the Hall Road development. District Councillor, David Sayer, will support this proposal.

PECREATION GROUND.

Councillor Holmes outlined the Committee's money raising and other activities, reported elsewhere in the Reeves Tale.


