

Bennett of Foxley wishes to lease part of the land to store glasshouses for approximately 6 months followed by a business of 5 years duration. Storage on our terms for a weekly rent of £4 was not carried.

Note: This result was interpreted as carried at the meeting but it was afterwards realised that insufficient votes were in favour.
