

Some of the Highways repairs have been completed and the Chairman agreed to contact N.C.C. again to discuss the remainder.

A letter from N.C.C.regarding 'no motor vehicles' signs on the Heath stated that they would have to be put up by the Landowners. Councillor Eglington (who is a member of the Heath Committee) agreed to raise the issue at the next Heath Committee Meeting.

<u>Planning</u> - Mr. & Mrs. Holt, Rose Cottage, The Street - 2 storey extension - no observations.

Mr. A. Battley, General Stores - Glass fronted Notice Boards - no observations.

Any Other Business - Councillor Farthing had received complaints regarding the old road that leads off the Norwich Road. This road is actually a private road that belongs to Mr. Gurney, Bawdeswell Hall, who is currently having work carried out on the road to convert it into a drive to his residence.

Councillor Farthing had also received complaints about the loudspeaker system used by Bennetts Garden Centre. Action is to be taken to rectify this problem.

A letter had been received stating that Dr. Pearson from the North Elmham surgery, is retiring soon. A party is

Councillor Holmes stated that plans had been received from the Architect for the new Village Hall but the idea of having a high roof to allow for Badminton had had to be abandoned as it was too costly. New plans are now being drawn. Hopefully the sale of the land which the current Hall sits on will bring in a large amount of money, obviously there are a lot of problems yet to be overcome, including what will happen during the changeover period but with everyone's enthusiasm these can be overcome.


