

BAWDESWELL PARISH COUNCIL - MINUTES OF MEETING HELD 9.1.89 IN THE VILLAGE HALL

Present - Councillors Sparkes (Chairman), Farthing, Eglington, Smith, Cooke, Holmes and Wright.

Apologies - None

Minutes of Previous Meeting - taken as read, agreed and signed.

Planning - 5 Hall Road, Bawdeswell - conversion of roof space - Council had no objection but application has now been withdrawn.

Land beside Woodbine House, The Street, Bawdeswell - erection of house and garage - Council stated that they would like written into the planning permission that the hedge at the front of the proposed property should be kept.

Flat 5, Bell Inn, Bawdeswell - erection of car port. Council had no objection, the B.D.C. have not yet passed, but the port has already been built. Chairman to consult with owner.

Land next to The House, Reepham Road, Bawdeswell - new two storey house and garage. Council have strongly objected to this being given planning permission as the proposed area is outside the village guidelines and also the entrance would be on a very dangerous corner.

Finance - Chairman presented a breakdown of costs so far in the Financial Year and also a rough budget for the year 1989/90. After discussion it was proposed by Councillor Smith that the precept for the coming year should be set at 4p, this was seconded by Councillor Holmes and unanimously agreed. This should bring the Council the sum of £2,008 and together with the Lighting Grant of £418 it is hoped that the Council will be able to pay off the remainder of the Bank Loan. So all future fund raising will go directly towards the building of the new Village Hall.

A letter had been received from the Dereham Citizens Advice Bureau requesting a donation. Councillor Smith proposed a donation of £20 this was seconded by Councillor Cooke and unanimously agreed.

Chairman stated that there were still three outstanding loans made by villagers who he was currently trying to trace which amounted to £40.

Recreation - Councillor Holmes stated that he had had a meeting with Mr. D. Wheeler of the Norfolk Rural

Matters Arising

Village Hall Signs - Parish Council have taken full responsibility for erecting the signs and a letter of apology has been sent to concerned residents.

Road Junction - Arrow not painted back on road from Fakenham direction following road resurfacing. The hatched markings have been removed from the box on the approach from Norwich to The Street, following meeting of Mr. Murrell/Mr. Cooper of Highways Dept.

Foul Drainage - Negotiations still in progress. Anglian Water have agreed our request for a new gate and hard standing also fencing to surround pumping station. Forms were delivered before Christmas to residents asking for a direct answer to Parish Council's question "Did they wish to be connected to the sewer in The Street?". At the present time 10 replies out of 29 have been received and the Parish Clerk will send them to A.W. with covering letter.

Precept - Our precept of £575 should arrive in April. It was agreed the Parish rate be left at 2p. We have money in hand of £666 Deposit Account plus £155 loan to Village Hall Table Tennis Club plus £325 for sale of land, equals £1,146. Of this approximately £500 for ornamental village sign to be paid, also a big uplift in our Village Hall Insurance from £39 to about £120 including contents, a mower will have to be purchased probably at cost of £300 (see below) plus caretakers fee of £8 per week for 26 weeks. Also Parish Clerk's salary £150 per year, plus expenses of stamps, phone calls and mileage approx. £80 in all. Also £15 donation to Citizens Advice Bureau, £8 C.P.R. subs. and National Association of Town & Parish Councils £18 which adds up to a grand total of

£1,399 leaving a Debit Balance of £253, deduct this from our precept of £575 and we are left with a Credit balance of £322 from this must come Petty Cash for copying, petrol for the mower and all other incidentals.

Grass Cutting - Parish Clerk has followed up an enquiry to get our grass cut free of charge, we learned of another village getting this service already, hopefully our enquiries will produce results.

Environmental Health - re Village Hall - Quote for retiling - new basins - and cupboards etc. for Village Hall of £520 is considered too high. Can we get a working party together to do the work? Mr. Cook has offered loan of scaffolding for decorating ceiling.

W. Potter, seconded T. Cook. C.P.R.E. to be considered later for donation.

Surveyors Land - Mr. T. Cook expressed a wish to rent or purchase Surveyors Land, and has been asked to submit a formal request with details of use to Parish Council for private consideration.

Highways - Potholes in Foxley. Parish Clerk to write to Safety Officer.

Planning Permission - granted to W. & J. de Havilland - conversion of barn to dwelling.

R.A. Dewing - extension to dwelling and new garage - Four Winds.

Community Council who assist the County Council in the administration of grants. Mr. Wheeler stated that it was possible that we may be eligible for a grant in 1991 (max. £15,000). He also stated that we may be able to obtain a grant from B.D.C. last year the max. they gave was £4,000. Mr. Wheeler gave the names and addresses of other possible sports councils where we may be able to obtain a grant, together with a book of various Hall designs - this is to be passed to the Architect.

The sale of the Hall and Bowling Green is complicated as both need new Trustees and also we need the authority of the Charities Commission before going ahead with the sale. Planning permission on this site for 2 houses has now been applied for and B.D.C. have no objections in principle. Mr. Ewing has agreed to Auction the land free of charge (except expenses).

The 200 Club is now in action again. There is a Jumble Sale on 25.2.89 and an Auction on 8.4.89.

Any Other Business - Clerk had received a letter from B.D.C. requesting that the village make an effort to keep clean and tidy in order to help promote tourism. There still seems to be a problem with rubbish being dumped on the Heath, one person from Dereham has recently been charged by the Police and another from Bawdeswell has been given a warning.

The Clerk is to write to the B.D.C. Highways Dept. as they have still not carried out the repairs we requested, also to advise them that the road outside Church Close is very uneven.

Clerk to write to Eastern Electricity as one of their poles on the Reepham Road has been moved and currently blocks the drain.

We are having problems with dogs fouling in private gardens, especially on Hall Road, and remind people that this is not only anti-social but unhygienic and unpleasant for the garden owners.

The position of Bawdeswell Parish Clerk will become vacant in the near future as the current Clerk is expecting a baby. Any interested applicant should contact Mr. Charles Sparkes on Bawdeswell 312.

LOCAL MYSTERY UNSOLVED - WHODUNNIT?

Letter to Norwich Mercury on April 2nd; - Sir,

"About 8 or 10 days ago, two husbandmen were digging a new ditch on Sparham Heath, they found. the bones of two men which are supposed to have been not many years buried, for the bones hung together and their hair was very fresh upon their heads: it's further remarkable that on both their skulls were several places dented in. as if they had been made with strokes on an hammer: and as it's not remebered that, any persons have been missing for some time past, its probable they may be the bodies of some unfortunate strangers which were robbed and murdered there. But what makes this supposition more to be credited, I am told, a few years ago a bloody shirt and some clothes were found in a grove hard by to this place".

EDITOR'S NOTE: - Actually, this letter was published in the Norwich Mercury of April 2nd 1743 and is quoted in the Bawdeswell Heritage Register. Don't miss the next gripping instalment in the March issue of the Reeves Tale, when the mystery will be resolved!




