The other day, we came across the name of Adolph S. Ochs, (1858-1935), sometime owner of the New York Times, who coined the motto "All the news that is fit to print". We like to think that the Reeve's Tale follows roughly the same principle, though we cannot, for the moment, recall having received any that was not fit to print. But as far as comparing these two worthy publications goes, the similarity stops with the motto and major differences appear.

At its peak, the New York Times runs to well over 100 pages whereas, even in a good month, we rarely achieve more than 30 and then only when our excellent contributors really let themselves go with descriptions of local happenings. To compensate for our lack of pages, we hope that you will feel that we make up in quality - and at least, you are spared the horrors of ten pages of world series baseball results and another ten detailing movements in the Dow Jones Index of share prices.

Though we do not know for certain, the New York Times probably costs the equivalent of £1 whereas your Reeve's Tale drops on the mat each month without charge. All we want to do here is to say thank you to all those who contribute towards our costs by placing their loose change in one of the shops' boxes and to ask you to keep it coming whenever you can, so that we can pay for the paper, stencils and other tools of our trade. We in turn will try to produce something to which you will look forward each month; along present lines, unless you tell us otherwise. Never mind the Americans - in Norfolk, we 'do different'.

LOCAL MYSTERY SOLVED?

In our February issue, we quoted from an old letter in the Bawdeswell Heritage register about the discovery of some bones on Sparham (i.e. Bawdeswell) Heath. As noted below, the theories of the writer were scorned a few days later:-

"April 26th 1743. I saw the place on Bawdeswell Heath where some human bones were lately dug up and in the Norwich, Ipswich and other newspapers said to be fresh, with hair on the skulls and ligaments of the joints compacted, but no such matter appears on inspection, for they have been buried many years and the green marks on the skull of one of them, now at Mr who married Mr. Igglesstone's daughter and lives in his house in Bawdeswell, were caused, I verily believe, by some old brazen armour, buckles or some such thing lying against it and causing it to 'cankerfret', as we say".

EDITOR'S NOTE

So that's alright then. On the other hand, some interesting questions are posed. Did Mr. Igglesstone's son-in-law collect any old skulls or only the cankerfretted variety? Were any others in the village interested in this unusual cult? And should the past tense of cankerfret be cankerfrit? Any ideas, readers?
