EDITORIAL - MAY

On 22nd June 1897, in honour of Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee, a sports meeting took place on Mr. Jas. Joice's Field, Bawdeswell followed by a Grand Display of Fireworks. Both the events in the programme and the prizes reflect the spirit of the time.

In the "100 Yards Obstruction Race for Farm Labourers", the lucky winner came away with a hat and the runner up got a pair of gloves. The "60 Yards Thread the Needle Race for Girls under 14" awarded four yards of calico to the winner, second prize a pair of scissors. One of the more popular events, with three prizes, appears to have been the "200 Yards Stripping Race (Open)" with three shillings for the top stripper and two and one shilling respectively for the others, presumably marginally slower. (The imagination starts to run riot - what would Queen Victoria have thought, we wonder?) But no doubt our local ancestors had a wonderful time, possibly rounding off the evening with a visit to one of the four village hostleries. A copy of the 1897 poster can be seen in the Village Stores, by courtesy of Andrew and Shirley Battley.

On Sunday, 23rd April 1989, Vic Myhill from Bawdeswell ran in and completed the gruelling 26 miles of the London Marathon, expecting no prize other than the satisfaction of having done so. But he carried on his back a wide local sponsorship on behalf of the new village hall fund and his achievement will result in a handsome contribution to its funding. We congratulate him on a first class effort like the event in 1897, very much in the spirit of the times.

Dear Friends,

Writing my May letter just a few days after the football stadium tragedy means that the matters of life and death are uppermost in my mind. Our thoughts and prayers go out to all the families from Liverpool who have lost loved ones.

The apparent escalation of tragedy over recent months has meant that by the very nature of events death is not quite the tabboo subject that it was. All of us seem freshly conscious "that in the midst of life we are in death".

At the same time as reading the reports of the Hillsborough disaster I was handed a school calendar which among other things gave the titles of the current term's Christian Union meetings. They too were about death - and Eternal Life. One title picked up words written by St. Paul "To die is gain". The full quote would explain things better - "For me to live is Christ, to die is gain". Paul had captured the secret of Eternal Life that Jesus came to give us; that it starts here and now and is found in Him alone. The greatest joy and happiness can be found in serving him now and then passing through the door of death to spend eternity in his presence.


Bereavement is a time of sadness and loss and I'm sure, like me, the families of those who died in Sheffield have been in your prayers, especially when so many of the victims were young people. 

SUMMARY OF MINUTES OF BAWDESWELL PARISH COUNCIL MEETING 3RD APRIL, 1989

Present - Councillors Sparkes (Chairman), Eglington, Holmes and Wright, the Clerk and 6 parishioners. Apology received from Mrs. Farthing.

The Chairman opened the meeting by introducing the new Clerk and presenting the retiring Clerk, Tracy Colman with a token of appreciation for the work she has done for the Parish Council.

Minutes - minutes of previous meeting were taken as read, agreed and signed.

MATTERS ARISING

Recreation - Councillor Holmes stated that a stalemate situation had been reached with regards to the hall and bowling green site. Our architect has approached the garage's agent with a view to a combined scheme, but without success. Neither has he received any confirmation of planning consent from the council. The chairman is to meet Mr. Daynes to discuss the matter as outline planning permission only is needed 'for the sale to proceed. Norfolk Rural Development Council acknowledge the possibility of a grant up to £15,000 but not until next year. Breckland D.C. say that £4,000 may be available in this financial year. The cost of the new bowling green is expected to be more than the estimated £10,000. The earliest date for the auction of the site is now May or June. The owner of the garage has informally expressed a wish to purchase the site, but no firm offer has been received.

<u>Surveyors Land</u> - A reply has been received from the Surveyors office regarding the valuation of the old Surveyor's Land on which planning permission is considered unlikely. Councillor Holmes stressed the importance of not selling too cheaply.

Auction - An auction in aid of funds is to be held on Saturday, 8th April at 2.30 p.m. with Ken Ewing as auctioneer.

<u>Clerk's Report</u> - Following the site meeting between the Chairman and Mr. Francis, Divisional Engineer, a letter has been received from Norfolk C.C. With regards to the speed limit extension on Bll45 there are limited resources for this type of work and it may be some time before it can be programmed. The suggested footpath extension in Paradise Road will be assessed to determine the priority.

A letter has been sent to the farmer requesting that the fence opposite the Billingford Road be repaired and that machinery uses the farm gate to the rear of the Old Rectory for access to the main road.

<u>Any Other Business</u> - Councillor Holmes reported having received a letter suggesting that the ban on dogs on the recreation ground was unreasonable provided they were on a lead and did not foul the ground. He thought, however, that in due course, with the ground developed, they would not be permitted under byelaws. There were queries about the Council's right to establish such a ban and the Chairman agreed to investigate the matter. Meanwhile, the sign would be altered to allow well-behaved dogs on a lead to walk the grounds, against the statutory penalties. The abuse of the ground by some motor-cyclists would be taken care of by gates to be installed in due course.

A letter from Breckland R.D.C. has been received outlining plans for a Community Car Scheme to aid non-car owners in visits to the doctors and Norwich, etc.

The question of who is responsible for overhanging trees and shrubs on public footpaths was raised. Hedgerows are the responsibility of the Highways Dept. and if from a private property then the tenants. Individuals should take the first step to remedy the situation and in the event of any problems should contact the Parish Council through the Clerk.




