



BAWDESWELL PARISH ROOM COMMITTEE

At its menthly meeting, the Committee considered what action to take in view of the failure to sell the site of the hall/bowling green to the garage. The Planning Authorities would be reluctant to revert to our earlier plan to build two houses, preferring the combined scheme covering the garage site also. As this is so indefinite, the Committee considered an alternative development which had been provisionally discussed with a local builder and which might appeal to the Planning Authorities, now well aware of the village's desparate need for a hall. (The Chairman reported that he had written to the Chairman of the Planning Committee and discussed our problems with him.) It was agreed that we will, in the meantime, discuss cur requirements with our Architect with a view to building a new hall in stages, allowing for further development as matters progress and funds become available. We would ask our Architect to attend cur next meeting. Further fund raising ideas are referred to in 'Village Briefs'.

VILLAGE BRIEFS

B'WELL PARISH COUNCIL The Council which has recently been meeting at 'The Willows' owing to the lack of any public room, has now been able to arrange to use the school. The meeting on Monday April 2nd will be the first under the new arrangement.

B'WELL CHURCHYARD AND CEMETERY After years of difficulty in arranging for grass and hedgecutting at both, you may recently have seen a team of young men working there on a Sunday morning. This is an example of the all round benefits of community service, through the Probation Officer in Norwich to whom we are grateful.

NOTES FOR YOUR DIARY, PLEASE ON Sunday 17th June, the B'Well Parish Room Committee is taking a stall at the Swant: n Morley Air Show on which a tombola will be run in aid of parish room funds. Please give us something that we can use on the stall and welcome members of the Committee when they come and ask for your support. ON Sunday 16th September, the same Committee will be holding a sports day and festival on the Recreation ground with a variety of attractions and events, details later. We wish we could say 'if wet in the village hall' but that is the whole point - we want to be able to say just that in future years.

B'WELL PARISH ROOM 200 CLUB The first draw will take place on April 2nd. There are still about 30 tickets available at the village stores and from members - don't miss your chance of £100 at the final draw!

BAWDESWELL PARISH COUNCIL MEETING 5th March, 1990.

SUMMARY OF MATTERS DISCUSSED

Present: Councillors Sparkes, Farthing, Holmes, Wright, Eglington, Smith, the Clerk and 10 parishioners.

In Attendance: District Councillor David Sayer and Mr. P. Daynes, Breckland Planning Officer. An apology was received from Councillor Cook.

PARISH ROOM COMMITTEE REPORT

At the invitation of the Chairman, Cllr. Holmes outlined the present position in respect of the proposed sale of the hall/bowling green site, intended to be used to finance the erection of a new hall on the recreation ground. Because our present planning permission was linked to that of the garage next door in respect of an overall scheme for nine houses, we were unable to go ahead unless the garage Our negotiations to sell our sites did likewise. to the garage had broken down and as we had no independent access to the road, an impasse had been reached. We had, therefore, written to Mr. Ian Howard, chairman of Breckland Planning Committee to suggest that we should be given planning permission to erect two houses, as originally intended; only thus would we be able to seek a purchaser. In our letter we pointed out how disadvantaged the village was in having no public room at all as a result of which the council meetings were held in a private house and the playgroup was having to meet in an old bus; there is no accommodation for any of the activities usual in a small rural village. need for a new hall is really urgent. Mr. Daynes explained the position from a planning point of view. In the interest of a balanced development, it would be difficult to accept two houses at the rear of a possible adjacent development (the garage site) and the planners would much prefer an overall scheme. On being asked whether planning permission might be given for a possible garage development on the by-pass, should a site become

available, Mr. Daynes felt that this would be unlikely because of visual impact in a conservation area - and for traffic reasons. The possibility of low cost starter homes was also discussed but Mr. Daynes said that these were usually on low cost sites outside the building guidelines areas rather than on prime sites within them.

pistrict Cllr. Sayer expressed the view that Bawdeswell had had a 'raw c' al' over the years, having seen extensive private development, with more to come, yet without any improvement in public acilities and this should be a strong point in any further applications on our part. Mr. Daynes thought that, if we applied for permission to erect a temporary building for use as a hall, either on the present site or on the recreation ground, this would almost certainly be approved, especially as the Breckland authorities were now well aware of the problems of the village. It was felt that the visit of Mr. Daynes and Cllr. Sayer had been helpful in enabling the problems to be aired and the council will now consider how to proceed.

OTHER BUSINESS

- 1. Highways Department had quoted £175 for erecting "Slow Please" signs on the Reepham Road. It was decided to leave this for the time being
- 2. Cllr Eglington understood that Rogers Bros. (Builders) may now have purchased the piece of land intended to be used as a play area behind Hall Road and the Clerk will write to confirm. Cllr. Smith suggested the Playing Fields Assocn. be asked for a grant to equip the area.
- 3. The Clerk will enquire of Highways Dept. regarding the state of the footpath to the school and the 'rubble strip' opposite Church Close, both of which need attention.

4. Clerk to contact Eastern Counties Bus Co. regarding the missing timetable notice board and damage caused by vandals.

- 5. It was agreed to oppose the replacement of the old style telephone kiosk with a new one.
- 6. The chairman has approached the School governors about the possibility of holding future council meetings in the school, the cost being £7.20 a session of 4 hours maximum. It was agreed to apply and to seek a grant from Breckland to cover the cost in view of our planning problems.

Next meeting (at the School) 2nd April at 7.30 pm.


