





#### Leaving Care

Can you help young people leaving care to become independant, to help them make the steps from adolescence into adult life.

We have all needed help from! time to time, where to claim benefits, where to find work or how to get into college. All these things most people take for granted, but for a young person who may have lost contact with their parents, it can be very difficult.

If you can help them help themselves it may be the break they need. We need people to offer supportive lodgings for the I6+ age group. Some may only need a bed and roof over their head, others need a great deal of support. You would receive £55 a week to cover rent and food. We need people that can offer emergency, short term placements as well as people that can offer long term support.

#### MINUTES OF PARISH COUNCIL MEETING HELD IN BAWDESWELL SCHOOL ON MONDAY 1st JULY, 1991

PRESENT - All Councillors, the clerk, architect Mr. Tan Cowles and 12 parishioners.

Models of the proposed new Village Hall and plans were available for inspection before the meeting commenced.

Mr. Cowles took the floor and outlined the planning concept of the new Village Hall. So that costs might be deferred the development will be in several stages and will eventually incorporate as well as the hall itself, an area for a playground, bowling green, football pitch and later still tennis, cricket, netball etc. There will be a car park with 65 spaces and the Hall will have toilets, kitchen, bar and committee room/hall as the first phase with a larger hall, changing rooms, stores and committee rooms to follow in later phases. It will be a relatively small building, phase 1 being equivalent to the present Village Hall, but with good viewing for sports in progress. The whole concept is projected in the best interests of as many people as possible for sport and leisure activities.

Time was then allowed for questions and comments. The main criticism was the siting of the Village Hall at the end of the garden of an adjoining house on the boundary of the property. Local authority will notify boundary owners of the procedure for objection. If sited at the back of the ground, hard road, sewage and services would need to go much further and would therefore be more costly.

The Chairman then expressed his disappointment at the small attendance and summarised the present position.

1. In regard to the possible sale of the old sites, the Charity Commission have required that they be valued and offered for sale on the open market.

2. Sites have been valued with planning permission for 5 starter homes at £47,500.

3. Ewings have offered them on the open market for 2 months at "offers in the region of £50,000".

4. An offer of £45,000 has been received, together with another possible offer if the intending buyer can also develop the garage site.

5. To accept an offer we will need the consent of the

All those that went to the poyal Norfelt Show obviously went clean and came back dirty due to the torrential rain on day one, but it didn't stop anyone from enjoying themselves.





#### RECOMMENDATIONS

a. That our Estate Agents be authorised to accept the offer of £45,000 if no better can be negotiated and provided the consent of the Charity Commission is obtained.

b. That the expenses in para.6 be shared between the parish room and bowling club trustees. (So far the parish room has paid all expenses)

c. That Bawdeswell Parish Council be asked to act as holding Trustees for the recreation ground land in the name of Bawdeswell Parish Room, with the exception of that land to be allocated to the bowling club in order to establish a new green. In the latter case the land be transferred to the trustees of the bowling club. (It is necessary for the parish hall land to be in the name of a registered charity for grant purposes.) d. Of the total proceeds of sale (before expenses) £15,000 be paid to the trustees of the bowling club and the remainder to the parish room committee. The bowling club will thereby have gained a much larger freehold site and a substantial part of the cost of developing a new and better green. The hall trustees will receive the remainder of the land and an amount towards the cost of a new hall.

It has to be said that these proposals have been put forward after consulting solicitors, especially about the attitude of the Charity Commission and that they are fair to all concerned and in the best interests of the whole village.

The Chairman said that all Trustees had recommended that the offer be accepted, including the Trustees of the Bowling Club land. He then asked that the Parish Council should accept the recommendations. Cllr. Sparkes proposed that the Bowling Club should lease the land from the Parish Council. It was explained that this would involve the Charity Commission who are notoriously slow in their dealings. Also it was agreed

that if it was the wish of the Bowling Club their trustees could be a corporation rather than individuals. They could indeed appoint the Parish Council.

It is important that the Farish Room (Village Hall) retains charitable statue in order to be eligible for grants and exemption from VAT. Possible grants are £15,00 (max.) from - the Rural Community Council and £4,000 from Breckland. Cllr. Battley asked what would happen to the Green if the Bowling Club became defunct. He was assured that it had to stay as a bowling green or other village amenity, in accordance with the terms of the trust. Cllr. Battley proposed that the recommendations put forward by the Chairman be accepted. Cllr. Strickland referred to the work done by the Chairman in this difficult task and seconded the above proposal. With the exception of Cllr. Sparkes who abstained, the proposal was carried unanimously.

<u>Planning</u>. 3/91/349F Extension to dwelling at 8 Hall Road. Permission granted.

The hedge from the school to the Old Rectory has been trimmed back. Another complaint received about the undergrowth in the lay-by on the Billingford Road. Clerk will see if it is Highways responsibility to cut this back.

Notice Board in Hall Road. Clerk will find out if planning permission is needed, also if a cheaper quote con be obtained for making a new board and repairing the old one.

There being no other business the meeting closed at 8.25 pm. There will be no meeting in August unless anything urgent arises.

#### A NEW VILLAGE HALL AND SPORTS CENTRE FOR BAWDESWELL

#### THE FACTS

I. The Parish Room Committee has spent over four years trying to resolve the problem of a new hall and sports centre for the village. In the course of its efforts, it has had to overcome planning problems on the old hall site, the unhelpful efforts of the previous garage owner, the steep decline in property values and the fact that all trustees of both the bowling green and hall sites were dead and had to be replaced.

2. Some years ago, the Parish Council bought the land on the Reepham Road as a sports centre and to house a new village hall when funds were available.

3. Through many money-raising activities, the overdraft for the purchase of the land has been repaid and the Parish Room fund has some £5,000 on hand.

4. Subject to contract and the agreement of the Charity Commission, the old hall and bowling green sites have been sold and agreement reached amicably about the division of the proceeds.

5. Provided we can complete the transaction and apply for grants from Breckland District and Norfolk County Councils, there is a good chance of receiving £19,000 in grants - but we must act swiftly.

6. The plans in the village stores represent the best possible solution to the siting of the new hall in the opinion of our architects. Bearing in mind objections raised at the council meeting on Ist July, we asked the architects to look at alternative sitings for the hall. They studied six possibilities but none was suitable due to drainage problems (requiring pumping equipment), access from the road and the proximity to houses on the Reepham Road. IN THE OPINION OF BOTH THE ARCHITECTS AND THE COMMITTEE? THERE IS NO ACCEPTABLE ALTERNATIVE.

7. The committee has put in hours of hard work in negotiations with various interested parties, solicitors, estate agents, the charity commission and others. The information given is FACTUAL and impartial and the committee considers it to be in the best interests of the village and commends it to everyone.


