

It's That Time of Year Again

-cold, wet and dark evenings. Last year about this time we had a spate of house burglaries which occurred during the early evening. The villains simply went round housing estates knocking on the doors of houses in darkness- at times as early as 4pm! In many house both parties work until 6pm and if nobody answers the door in they go and make off with the video, jewellery and anything else they can carry. If somebody did answer their knock, as happened at a house with thick curtains, they asked a silly question like 'Where's the nearest garage?'

There are two things you can do to deter these criminals:

1. Install a timing device to turn on your lights, or even a radio. They cost less than £20 and are very effective. (I've got one).

2. If you are at home and the silly question comes note their description-better still their car number. Then 'phone the police IMMEDIATELY.

If you have any doubts about the security of your home please do contact Dereham Police Station (PC330 Coppack on Dereham 693451). Trained police officers will be pleased to visit, free of charge, to carry out a full crime prevention survey and offer advice to suit your needs and your pocket. As stated, it is a <u>free</u> service, so please use it.

It's a dangerous time for cyclists: especially those who try to be 'green' and cycle to work during the early, dark hours of the morning and the later, dark, hours of the evening. School children cycling to school should ask their parents for reflective jackets and helmets and proper lights for their cycles - a low cost to help prevent the loss of a life!

On our narrow rural roads drivers must think 'pedestrian' 'cyclist' or even 'lady with pram'. They cannot climb the bank to get out of the way. Motorists should check their vehicle lights are in good working order DAILY before use. Treat yourselves to some spare bulbs.

On day nine our cat left home - by lunchtime Dad was blotto. He said he had to have a drink to face up to risotto.


By the tenth day the booze was gone (except our home-made brew). As if that wasn't bad enough we suffered turkey stew.



Arts Grants for Rural Norfolk are seeking applications from town and village groups in the Breckland area interested in starting their own art

Up to £500 could be available for any project which complies with a number of basic criteria.

Grants are intended to help village and town groups bring some lasting benefit to their communities through the use of art whether it is music, visual art, crafts, drama, dance or literature.

visual art, crarts, draina, dance of internation The scheme is designed to help local groups run their projects in and for their own communities. Indeed the most important consideration of any application will be the extent to which the project will be locally generated and managed.

Breckland's Arts Development Officer, Daryl Fraser, says, 'This grant scheme presents an ideal opportunity for local groups to try something a bit different which will enrich the cultural life of their community. It is the first scheme designed by a national organisation to suit the needs of rural communities which have in the past been overlooked by the arts establishment. I welcome it and will be glad to offer advice to any group in the district who may be thinking about running their own art project

Councillor Vacancy- if the District Council have not received two or more requests to fill this post by 9th November 1994, then the Parish Council can co-opt a volunteer at their next meeting.

Council Telephone Calls- the Clerk had applied for a B.T. Chargecard which will be used for all Parish business calls from now on. The cost and details of each call will appear on her bill and be presented to the Parish Council each quarter.

Best Kept Village Competition Results- Bawdeswell's position was slightly improved this year coming 4th out of 6 (rather than 7th from 8) More details reported elsewhere in the Reeve's Tale.

Highways matters- the poor state of the footpath outside the entrance to Folland Court and the need for salt bins has been reported to Highways and a reply is awaited.

Financial matters- it was decided not to send a donation to the Dereham C.A.B. this year in order to concentrate Council funds on local needs such as the Village Hall. The Clerk will write to explain. -It was agreed to purchase two large scale maps to assist the Ambulance Service in pinpointing houses with vague addresses. -A cheque for £2000 was received which is the second instalment of the Parish Precept.

Village Hall Driveway- it was agreed to provide a concrete 'apron' and sleeping policemen to help prevent the problem of stones creeping out onto the Reepham Road and cut the speed of cars along the driveway, at a cost of £578.78 plus VAT.

-The Clerk will also check whether it is possible to have a sign on the main road showing the entrance to the Village Hall more clearly.

Common Lane- the County Council have still not resolved the problem of the 'Lake' at the top of this lane. County Councillor Ingrid Floering-Blackman has said she will try to attend the next meeting, so it was decided to discuss this issue with her then.

A Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year from the Reeve's Tale Dec '94- Jan '95 Recreation Ground hedging- the solicitors had advised that most of the hedging (apart from the private, planted sections) was jointly owned; with the Council responsible for the Recreation Ground side and the private owners responsible for their side. Written confirmation of this was in the post and the Clerk was instructed to get quotations for a tractor/hedge trimmer to cut the appropriate hedges twice a year.

Village Hall- a small profit was made from the Firework Display due to more fireworks but fewer people this year.

There had been some unexpected expenses recently, including two broken windows, a broken door and anti-fly treatment. As the second year since the opening of the Hall is nearly over there was more concern and discussion about the lack of use of the building and lack of support for functions and interest in the Committee. Changes to the internal layout to make it into a Social Club with a cosier atmosphere and a weekend bar is one possibility but again this needs involvement from local people in planning and setting up new arrangements. It would also cost money to refit the building and provide staff to run the Club. Any views and ideas would be welcome and can be sent via the Parish Council or to any Committee Member. In the meantime the Chairman offered to sponsor one year of advertising in the Reeve's Tale to publicise the facilities and costs of the Hall.

Coping with a major disaster- P.C. Jackson brought details of the North Breckland Emergency Volunteers. See details elsewhere in this Reeve's Tale.

Planning- a parishioner expressed concern about the number of advertising signs, flags, notices etc at the Garden Centre. While this is an asset to the village and got a special, favourable mention in the Best Kept Village report, the Clerk will write to ask for some restraint on notices to keep the site tidy and attractive.

The Old Toll House- County Hall agreed to inspect and report on their opinions of this building which is becoming more and more dilapidated. The Clerk will chase them for a reply.

The next meeting is Monday 5th December at 7.30pm in the Village Hall.

A small churchyard should be so easy to keep tidy as a fitting setting for your elegant church. Footings should be cleared and it's a pity your commemorative seat is overgrown. Hall: Your new hall is a great asset which must have revitalised the village.

Green: -

Recreation Ground: Pleasing. Bowling green immaculate. New tree planting noted.

War memorials and fixed equipment: Very good village sign in pleasant green area with two good seats. Bench missing from one bus shelter. Estates: Residential properties average to good. Some interesting houses in main street.

Commercial premises etc: New shop and butcher's shop clean and tidy. High standard- garden centre.

Village Centre: Has character and is kept tidy. An attractive approach from the main road.

Tidiness: Litter in telephone box.

Public Buildings & Facilities: Cemetery is no better than when this particular team of judges last saw it a few years ago. Very unkempt. General comments: The village has character and is mainly well looked after, but you have one or two black spots. If you could improve the condition of the churchyard, and particularly the cemetery, your position could be much higher.


