



Digest of Bawdeswell Parish Council Meeting held on 12th September 1994

County Councillor Ingrid Floering-Blackman attended this meeting in order to keep in touch with the Parish and help with any County matters.

Speed Checks - As requested the Clerk has contacted the Police- Traffic Section, who will be running a speed check on the Norwich/Reepham Road shortly.

Village Hall Driveway - It was found that the deeds for the Village Hall do include a clause to say that the adjoining house, with a right of way across the drive, should contribute to the upkeep of the driveway. The Clerk will write to the Householder accordingly.

There was some concern about the problem of the gravel at the entrance to the drive, which 'creeps' over the footpath and into the main road. Councillor Wright was asked to obtain an estimate for a tarmac section, and sleeping policeman, to alleviate the problem.

Finance - £345.63 received for VAT reclaimed over the past year's expenditure.

Cheques paid out: - £154.80 for Public Liability Insurance Premium; £108.86 to Auditors and £297.93 transferred to Village Hall for their VAT refund, which was paid to the Parish Council in the first instance. County Council Surveys - In partnership with the University, the County are carrying out a hedgerow survey using samples across Norfolk to give a better understanding of regional variations and historical development. The Clerk will find out more details but if anyone is interested in helping with the survey, please contact her on 688753.

-The County is also looking at paths, bridleways and byways and sought clarification on two in the Parish. For general information please note that Common Lane is a bridleway as far as the Parish Boundary and Heath Lane, running from Billingford Road up to (but not across) the Heath, is also a bridleway. Anyone wishing to use the Heath with horses must have an agreement with the Heath Trustees (see notice in Heath Car Park).

Adam's Pit - Based on an acceptable quotation it was agreed that Nigel Curtis should be appointed to maintain this area, with two visits a year to keep the undergrowth at bay.

Recreation Ground - Some trees and hedging are still to be done to complete the planting scheme, but are due to arrive this autumn. Councillor Wright asked for clarification of ownership and responsibility for all the hedge boundary. The Clerk will ask the solicitors for advice.

Police - PC Peter Jackson attended the meeting to introduce himself and explain the village police service. He will be writing a full report for the Reeves Tale.

Highways - The Clerk will remind Highways about the filling in of the 'puddle' at the entrance to Common Lane and ask for the footpath outside Folland Court, in the Street, to be repaired.

The Old Toll House - Its dilapidated condition is causing concern again. Councillor Floering-Blackman advised contacting County Hall about listing. The Clerk will seek advice and report back.

Local Government Review - There was a discussion of the options and it was unanimously agreed to vote for the status quo option, which the Clerk will send to the Commissioners.

District Local Plan - The deadline for comments on the first draft expired at the start of September. Councillor Wright in particular was not happy with the lack of scope for new housing, particularly low-cost housing as previously proposed.

The next meeting is on Monday 3rd October at 7.30pm in the Village Hall.





A Policing Charter for Norfolk

Sunday 16th Orlober 100cm

In addition to the everyday demands made upon us we, the men and women of the Norfolk Constabulary, aim to help to develop a safe and pleasant environment in which to live. This is stated in the booklet Raising our Standard - A Policing Charter for Norfolk. This new policing charter sets out the key objectives for policing and endeavours to answer some of the questions the public may have about the service provided. Although it is not possible to provide a copy with every parish magazine, copies have been proportionately distributed to each area so please ask around.

YOU, the members of the community, are an essential ingredient for successful policing and YOU are in the best position to observe and report on what is going on in your community. YOUR EYES are our eyes - but it is essential that you 'phone 999 immediately you see anything remotely suspicious. however trivial it may seem to you. We will not think it trivial and all items of information will be treated with complete confidentiality. THE MOST IMPORTANT THING IS TO PHONE IMMEDIATELY, preferably with CAR REGISTRATION NUMBER if applicable (if possible write it down) and MAKE AND COLOUR OF VEHICLE if known. If an incident attracts your attention it is likely to be reportable so DON'T GIVE THE GAME AWAY, DON'T WASTE TIME, 'PHONE 999.

If you have any queries or would like to speak to your parish liaison officer, Police Constable 898 Pete JACKSON is your man for Hoe, Lyng, Swanton Morley, Bintree, Foxley, Sparham, Billingford, Bylaugh, Bawdeswell and Worthing.
