



- Further to an earlier application from Mr Gurney to demolish Tollgate Cottage, the Clerk read out correspondence from Breckland DC who are sympathetic to local wished to retain this building and hoped the Parish Council might be able to help. Between meetings the Clerk and the Chairman had discussed the problem of lack of resources to renovate the Cottage and the Clerk then passed the comments onto Breckland. A letter with their final decision is awaited.

- The order for the fencing to the Play Area has been placed with May Gurney. The width of the gates to allow access for the gang mower on the 5-a-side pitch had to be changed from 2.4 metres to 3 metres after consultation with Norfolk County Services, which will increase the price slightly. A delivery date is yet to be confirmed.

A letter from Jack Bristow of Bawdeswell School was read out. Class 4 have taken up the cause of this fence and dog-free areas as a project and will be holding a disco with barbeque and sports to raise money towards the cost. The class also offered to help with the installation.

-Recreation Ground Hedging. The Clerk had made extensive enquiries into the tenders submitted and it was decided not to go ahead with the lowest tender as this was for work to be done with a flail and would have left masses of debris to clear and damage to hedge. She will be meeting the Project Manager from County Services to draw up a full report with recommendations on how the hedge can be thickened and maintained in the long term, with costs for the Council to consider at the next meeting. As the hedge is extensive and has never had any planned maintenance, this is likely to be expensive but it was agreed to be a prudent plan to preserve the boundary and prevent future problems.

 As the nomination papers for the Parish Elections were received so late, in order to meet the deadline they were delivered by Courier.
 Councillor Battley took personal responsibility for this initiative and agreed to bear the cost himself.

School Report

The number of pupils is still running at just under 100. An application from the Resource Centre (in the Old School House) to use the school playing field, was refused by the Governors.

Recreation Report

Councillor Wright reported that the committee urgently needed more members as they are now down to only five, which is the minimum

number. Mr Lees has now taken over as Treasurer.

April was a slightly better month showing a profit of £427 and the proceeds from the recent Dog Show were over £300.

Any Other Business

A Parishioner asked for the Parish Council view on the re-activated Poultry Unit at the rear of Church Close which is causing nuisance to neighbours as it is smelly, noisy and adjacent to their houses. This unit has not been used since before 1987, when the houses were built. Local residents had already been in touch with Environmental Health and Planning to see whether it was possible to restrict the use of the sheds as they are so close to the houses and there are concerns about health, property values and the long term future of the site. The Parish Council were sympathetic to these concerns and the Chairman asked to be notified the next time the nuisance occurred so he could visit the area. Residents were advised to continue dealing with Breckland DC and consider writing to County Councillors, the MP and a petition if necessary.

The Parish Council were questioned again about the reasons for the increase in the precept this year. The Chairman explained the rising costs of local services such as the Recreation Ground adn the Churchyard and Cemetery, which need to be maintained but for which there are no more volunteers and the need to underwrite the costs of the new Village Hall to help it through its early years, in the hope that it will later become self financing. The Council plan to review this strategy annually and aim to remove this cost to the precept in the future but it does rely on more support for and use of the Hall from local people. Next meeting Monday 5th June 1995 at 7.30pm in the Village Hall.




We welcome Louise Baker from City College Norwich who is doing her work experience at Bawdeswell School, particularly with Class 1.

The Reeve's Tale - June 1995

Foxley Parish Council Minutes of the Meeting held on Thursday 13th April 1995 at the Village Hall

Present: Cllr Skinner (Chairman), Cllrs Davis, Saker and Slattery, the clerk and seven parishioners.

Matters Arising: The Clerk read out a letter received from Mr D Cumming of Breckland Traffic Management after the meeting of those parishioners able to attend, himself and the Clerk regarding various highway matters affecting the village. Request for a speed limit through The Street will be added to the pending list for consideration. Additional warning lines will be added to the existing road markings at the junction with the A1067 in an effort to prevent overtaking at this point. The rerouting of traffic to Foxley Wood is considered unlikely as there is not a more suitable alternative. Mr Townly, the Maintenance Engineer, has arranged an inspection of the overgrown footpath outside the Rectory.

Election of Councillors

There were no valid nominations for councillors for Foxley Parish Council for the election to be held on 4th May. This will be readvertised in due course, and hopefully with more success. The re-run of the election will cost the village more money!

Finance

Balance at the bank is £184.87. Precept and Parish Grant totalling £1,000 is due any day. The Auditors have invited Foxley to participate in a scheme whereby the accounts will be audited once every three years instead of annually as at present. Benefits will include a lower audit fee. Letter received from Foxley Village Hall Committee Chairman regarding the on-going cost of renovating the kitchen area of the Hall. Units offered last year in lieu of hard cash by the Parnell-Cooks have proved incomplete and therefore useless. Request for a grant of say £150 would make further grants available through Breckland and the County Council. Cllr Slattery proposed that £200 be made available.

Correspondence

Two letters received from Rev Humphries who was unable to attend as this was Maundy Thursday. One letter concerned the footpath outside the Rectory (already mentioned earlier) which is understood to be the responsibility of Breckland District Council and has only been cleared twice in the eleven years that Rev Humphries has been in the village. The other letter expresses concern over the inclusion of Foxley in the Best Kept Village Competition as much voluntary help will be needed to raise the churchyard to a suitable standard. At a recent open meeting the state of the church and churchyard was discussed at length. £6000 is needed urgently to enable application for further grants needed to prevent the church falling into serious decay. The Best Kept Village Competition was discussed further. Ken Walton suggested dividing the village into sections and enlisting a volunteer from each of the areas to be responsible for chivvying along parishioners into keeping their patch clear. This was thought a good idea and possible volunteers were discussed and will be approached shortly. Preliminary judging is in June with the results published in late Autumn.

A request was made for regular meetings of the Parish Council, say every two months on the first Thursday, or whenever is most suitable to those involved. This will come into effect as and when new Councillors are elected.

Foxley Clerk will be unable to continue with the post after the end of July. There is a small salary and payment of expenses. The job is interesting, involving taking minutes at the six to eight meetings held annually and dealing with correspondence.
