



Bawdeswell Parish Council

Minutes of Meeting held in the Village Hall on Monday 6th January 1995.

Present - Councillors Battley (Chairman), Sparkes, Wright, Strickland, Farthing, Cunliffe and Johnson, and two Parishioners.

Apologies - None. Minutes - Agreed and signed.

Matters Arising - Councillor Cunliffe asked if the £6000 precept agreed at the last meeting was now confirmed. The Clerk showed the acknowledgement from Breckland D.C., the Parish will also receive £1,231 Parish Support Grant. Clerk's Report

Finance - agreed cheque no 100172 to Norfolk County Services in the sum of £45.21 for the VAT on the Ground Maintenance Contract; no 100173 to N.G. King in the sum of £680.06 for the driveway works and no 100174 to NCA of P&TC in the sum of £1.79 for the 1995 Handbook.

Correspondence

Salt Bins - some time ago the Council had put in a request for salt bins and had been told their request was on a waiting list. Recently Norfolk County Council had written saying it would only provide the salt and the Parish would need to buy the bins themselves. The Clerk had been asked to check on the reasons for this change of heart and found that there had been a policy review and so no new bins are now provided.

Best Kept Village - it was agreed to enter the competition again this year. Councillor Johnson agreed to look out for an application form in the EDP and

pass to the Clerk.

Ground Maintenance Contract - Two tenders had been received for this work. It was agreed to accept the tender from Norfolk County Services as theirs was the lowest price, by almost £100. It was also agreed to enter into a five year contract deal which represents better value for money.

Only one quotation had been received for the hedge trimming work on the Recreation Ground. The Clerk was instructed to get a second quote from Norfolk County Services in order to get the best price before a decision is made. Playground Inspection - It was agreed to have a RoSPA inspection of the play area

again this year. This will be carried out in June 1995.

Inspection of Roads and Paths - At the last meeting the Clerk was asked to clarify some points about the proposal to transfer responsibility for some of these areas to the Parish. Breckland have advised that the two areas in question are, the layby fronting the ex-Council Houses on the Reepham Road and parts of Folland Court. (The remainder being Norfolk County Council's responsibility). They also said there would be no liability on the Parish if there was an accident on these paths and that they would consider paying the Parish for time spent on inspections which would need to be carried out every six to eight weeks. It was agreed that the Clerk should write back for an absolute guarantee of no liability for accidents, a map of the Folland Court paths affected and clarification on how reports should be made.

Churchyard and Cemetery - A reply was read out from the Reverend Humphries which asked for the Parish Council's help in maintaining these areas.

In the context of subsequent discussions about the increase in Parish spending. due to the cost of the Village Hall and the decline of volunteer activities, there was some concern about assuming yet another financial responsibility. As a first step it was agreed that the Clerk would discuss these concerns with the Reverend Humphries and find out the scope and frequency of the work involved so that quotations could be obtained, if no volunteers could be found. Planning

- Planning permission given for the standing of a mobile home behind the Old Rectory Restaurant (Planning ref 3/94/1189/F)

- Application received from Mr A Jones to build extension to Field View, 25 Reepham Road. No objections.

School Report - The Chairman reported that all was running well. Numbers are still up. The new entrance works are complete and a full report on activities appears every month in the Reeve's Tale.

Recreation Report - Tickets for Valentine's Night were still available and numbers were low again. A further Social Night is arranged for 4th March. More ideas for events and members for the Committee would be very welcome. Any Other Business

Following Councillor Wright's letter to the Reeve's Tale there was a full discussion about the problem of dogs fouling the Recreation Ground. It was decided that a fund to provide fencing around the Play Area and 5-a-side pitch should be started and a clear declaration of the Parish Council's support to stop this anti-social and dangerous practice. Councillor Strickland was asked to provide more information about the health problems.

The Clerk will obtain prices to provide chain link fencing, with gates for maintenance and access.

Councillor Wright passed a cheque to the Clerk to start the fund. Councillor Johnson reported that the Bottle Bank needed emptying. The Clerk

A Parishioner questioned why the precept for 1995/96 had been increased to £6000. The Chairman explained the decision had not been taken lightly but went over the budget figures again. Over the last two years costs had been rising steadily; last year the precept did not change but now reserves had been used up. Some tasks in the village which were done by volunteers in the past, such as looking after conservation areas, planting trees etc had now been taken on by the Parish Council, due to lack of public support; the Village Hall had not produced the income to support itself, as was hoped, again due to lack of support. The reasons for this are of great concern to the Parish Council and it is keen to keep a Village Hall and encourage local commitment to the Village in general. However, the Hall must start to pay its own way one day and certainly be more regularly used. This situation is discussed at almost every Parish Council meeting but all members are concerned for the future as money cannot keep being increased to keep the building going indefinitely. So the message is'Use it or lose it'!

Foxley Parish Council

Minutes of Meeting held in the Village Hall on Thursday 2nd February 1995.

Three parishioners, three councillors and the clerk turned out for this meeting. At the end of this financial year there will be £184.87 in the bank with £1,000 due from Breckland at the beginning of April. This is made up of the precept set this vear at £571 plus the Parish Support Grant of £429. Expenditure for the year incluedes Village Hall and Employer's Liability (compulsory) £250, the audit fee £100, the clerk's salary £300 along with petty cash, various subscriptions and donations throughout the year.

Foxley has decided to enter the Best Kept Village Competition this year and it is

hoped that this will generate a little more community spirit.

There are again complaints of dogs fouling walkways and public areas. Also once again the lay-bys are in a disgraceful state though this is more likely to be from people passing through the village than from residents. Similarly we have received many complaints about the dangerously muddy condition of the Themelthorpe Road. The footpath outside Floranova is in need of more attention as the roots left under the surface are beginning to sprout. Traffic speeding through The Street is still a nuisance and a danger. After a large (for Foxley) representation of parishioners at the end of the year concerned about the problem there was no follow-up at the next meeting when people were needed to air their grievances directly with an officer from the Highways department. To date this meeting has not taken place, however the Clerk is arranging to meet with Highways and any other interested parties at the end of February. It was agreed to have a waste paper bank sited in the village, probably beside the Village Hall, for a trial period. Breckland Council will pay £5 per tonne to village

A suggestion was made that a sand/salt bin in the village would be useful during the winter months for use by any parishioners on icy stretches. The clerk will

make enquiries.

The need for a volunteer or group of volunteers to do odd 'tidying up jobs' in the village was discussed. With a little thought it could be possible to benefit the village considerably - improving its appearance, encouraging participation in village life and maybe relieving elderly or disabled residents of tasks they find difficult or impossible to cope with. In this year of the Best Kept Village Competition perhaps this is the time to get some sort of scheme off the ground. The next meeting of Foxley Parish Council will be on Thursday 13th April at 7.30pm in the village hall. Do come along to support your village and air your views.




