MINUTES OF LAST MEETING: duly agreed and signed. MATTERS ARISING:

- New Premises Licence for Village Hall will cost £60 for 'variation of existing Public Entertainment Licence and £180 annual fee. PC to pay costs from £1,000 included in Precept for Village Hall expenses

- Rural Transport – meeting to be held at Elsing Village Hall on Monday 18th July at 7pm to discuss possibility of new bus route.

- Mr. Gurney removing rubbish at top of Common Lane.

Planning: No Objections to following 3 PA's

-Old Workhouse Paddocks, Reepham Road – Field Shelter. (Breckland investigating report that premises being used for residential use./ Two Fields Way-2 storey extension/3 Chaucer Close- Conservatory

PP granted to: Chaucer House -conservatory/Bawdeswell CP School -windows.

Old Workhouse Bar, The Street – Mr. & Mrs. Brindle attended the meeting and discussed the complaints received about noise levels/parking and confirm they are complying with Breckland's PP conditions. The PC wished them all the best with their business but asked them to bear in mind the goodwill of the village.


-Deer sign put up in wrong place - 20mph speed limit to be investigated this year April 05/April 06 but no clear date given.

New recycling section for Paper/Bottle/Can Banks and Cleanway bin finished. The PC would like to thank everyone involved in making this possible- it took a lot of hard work to accomplish and will be much easier to keep tidy. Complaints about dog fouling (see separate note)/ cars being parked on grass verge at entrance to Hall Road – Clerk has spoken to parishioner and hopefully this will not occur again.

Minutes: The minutes of the last meeting were accepted and signed.

Matters arising: Insurance-Clerk to seek the same but less expensive cover. AWA - Chairman still seeking confirmation of what is being done regarding W Foxley. Clerk discovered that "Foxley" is on an AWA list for work. Both items to be pursued vigorously.

Village Seat - The seat had been there for 18 years and sadly it was felt that the PC were unable to justify moving it.

Bus Shelter - Working party on Sat 13 Aug from 7.0am. Nick Mears will welcome contact from volunteers.

Homewatch sign - Mr Harvey will take the matter in hand.

Speed Camera - Inspector Rush will organise a radar watch at an appropriate place and time.

Correspondence: included thanks from Reeves Tale, New Best Performance Plan from Breckland letter from Planning re shed at Old Chapel. Clerk to reply to the latter.

Planning Applications: Permission was granted to: Eastland & Tedore for brick shed &RD & JM Mann for erection of agricultural worker's dwelling & garage. Application for E Wright -an extension at Oakwood Farm was awaiting a decision. Permission was refused to Mr P Davis for 2 plots adjacent Church Farm Barns. He has since appealed and any objections have to be sent to the Inspector within 6 weeks. The Parish Council will be replying strongly to the Inspector stating that in objecting to this application, they are doing their statutory duty to the Planning Authority and to the wishes of the majority of the parishioners.

Village Appraisal: Some discussion resulted in defining a need for enthusiastic volunteers to help complete parts of the action plan. Many of the points were changed from short term to ongoing.

Finance: The clerk received permission to change accounts to try to get more interest on the deposit account. The financial report was circularised, explained and accepted. Payment was approved for the Clerk's expenses. The audit of accounts would soon be complete and available for inspection. Dates to be posted up. The Village Hall Committee requested a letter from the PC indemnifying a loan in order to receive further grant aid for the building of the extension. This was duly given. **Date of the next meeting:** Thursday 22 September at 7.45 pm - Thursday 1 December and Thursday 16 February 2006, both at 7.30pm.

THE BOOK CLUB

The book choice for the **next meeting on Thursday 4 August** is When we were Orphans, by Kazuo Ishiguro who was also the writer of The Remains of the Day, which was made into a film. He studied at UEA and this book was short listed for the Booker Prize in 2000. We meet in the Workhouse Bar at 7.30 p.m. and new members are always welcome.

July Review - The Thirty- Nine Steps by John Buchan

The book was written in 1915 and starts with the main character, Richard Hannay, bemoaning the fact that "having made a modest pile" as a mining engineer in South Africa he has returned to London in his early 40's with nothing to do except "luncheon" and "dine" in various upper class establishments.

Luckily for him, on his return home one night, he is approached by a total stranger, an American agent called Scudder, who informs Hannay that Europe is on the brink of an enormous diplomatic incident should a proposed assassination attempt on a senior figure be successful.

Hannay invites Scudder to seek refuge and on returning home the following evening finds him murdered on the drawing room floor. Intent on solving the riddle of who is behind the impending assassination attempt, Hannay takes Scudder's little note-book of secrets (not so secret that Hannay could not easily find it however!) and instead of going to the police (which would have made it an extremely short story) he flees London and finds himself a desperate man on the run hotly pursued by both the police and the vigilantes behind the proposed assassination attempt.

The book is full of derring-do in a Famous Five sort of way and although he doesn't have "lashings of ginger beer" he does make comments like "he seemed an honest stout fellow -I liked the cut of his jib" or words to that effect! The language used was incredibly dated and the plot totally implausible -that so many strangers should unquestioningly take in and feed a man clearly on the run... and, my favourite, where he crashes in on a dinner party, accuses the assembled company that they are a bunch of murderous spies and, after they deny it, sits down for a glass of brandy and hand of bridge with them to deliberate.

Our verdict -a very quick read, you'll enjoy it is you like Boy's Own type stories and a good laugh (unintentionally) if you don't. You will be disappointed, as we were, that only the film version has him he climbing Big Ben's tower and hanging perilously off the hands of the clock.



The Nightjar: 'An eerie, fascinating and beautiful creature'

Taking advantage of our somewhat unpredictable summer we had two outdoor meetings in June. The first was a bird race, in which teams compete to identify as many species as possible in an allotted time. This was an excellent day with notable sightings of Wood Lark, Honey Buzzard and Nightjar. The winning team managed to observe 82 species. Later in the month we had a Nightjar evening. Starting at Dersingham Bog (a small nature reserve within the Sandringham Royal Estate) we had excellent views of Tree Pipits but the Wood Larks proved elusive. Later we retired to the Feathers Hotel in Dersingham for some sustenance, returning to the Bog at dusk when we saw Woodcocks and later Nightjars in flight and sitting on overhead cables. A thoroughly enjoyable evening. Thanks to Ray Gribble for organising.

Just to show how organised we are, following the talk on Pensthorpe in July we visit the reserve on Saturday August 6^{th} . Set in 500 acres of beautiful countryside near Fakenham, Pensthorpe Park is home to one of Europe's finest collection of endangered and exotic birds. It is accessible to wheelchair users, has a shop café and the usual facilities. Not to be missed. Meet in the car park at 10 a.m. There is an admission charge but our worthy leader is hoping to negotiate a group rate.

We now have a safer church and one which complies with modern electrical safety standards.

At the same time we have installed a hearing aid Induction Loop system to help those with hearing difficulties and comply with the Disability Act .

Whilst this work was going on, the weather dislodged another piece of wood from the spire and urgent repairs had to be put in hand by a couple of steeplejacks - young Fred Dibners.

None of this comes cheap and we are so grateful to the fundraising efforts of the Church Friends when it comes to such emergencies.

In August our new regular service pattern comes into force, i.e. all services in Bawdeswell at 10am every Sunday.

We hope this will make it easier for everyone. We will miss our monthly evening service of Words & Praise which many of us have come to love, but this will continue as a morning service on the same (second) Sunday of every month and may even replace the traditional Morning Prayer on the third Sunday if this can be agreed by all. A friend of mine was being interviewed by a NewYork-based radio station, shortly after the bombs went off in London. He was asked: "Why do people do acts like this?", and answered: "Because of fundamentalism." "I agree, it's all the fault of Islamic fundamentalism", said the interviewer. "No," my friend jumped in, "I didn't say Islamic, I said fundamentalism."

This was fighting talk, when you consider that many fundamentalists of any religion do not think of themselves as dangerous. They often don't want other people to have freedoms of which they don't approve; wanting to silence free speech and regulate people's behaviour. But they don't see themselves as killers, rather as orderly people.

From one standpoint, my friend was right. The problem is fundamentalism, because fundamentalists will always be at war with liberal values. But from a fundamentalist's point of view, the problem is liberal values, which allow people to make mistakes too freely. There are people who passionately believe that freedom is less important than being right, even if they have been given freedoms in the society in which they live that they would deny to others.

When the Queen, after the explosions, said that the bombers would not be able to threaten our way of life, she was right: we are even more determined to assert the value of the freedoms that we have. But this must include the right of minorities to exist peaceably among us. Most of us in this country are the result of successive waves of invasion and immigration: Romans and their armies, Anglo-Saxons, Danes, Normans, European Protestants fleeing persecution, African slaves, Jews fleeing persecution, workers from around the world.

We have a society which has many strands. Fundamentalism suggests that there is only one strand that matters. Some fundamentalists separate themselves from society in order to have purity; others try to change society, either by growing in numbers or by direct action. Our society is now composed of people not only from different bloodlines and backgrounds but with different ideas. How is there going to be room for all of us?
