

Village Hall Extension : A strong discussion followed letters of appeal to the Parish Council for extra funding to help build a much needed extension to the Village Hall. The Vice Chairman declared his interest and offered to leave as he could be a key figure in building the extension. The Chairman thanked him but asked him to stay to answer technical questions about the building. The VHC needed a donation from the PC. It is important that the PC support the VHC in this way in order to receive a grant and Mrs Floering Blackman would check with RCC re grant possibilities. Finally it was agreed to give a one off payment of £500 to the VHC and to support them in their bid for grants.

Planning Applications: None

Report on Bus Shelter: No further progress was able to be made at this time as it had been agreed by Highways, Transport etc that lay byes must be constructed before the new bus shelter can be installed and as there is no present funding, the status quo must remain. The Vice Chairman would organise repairs to the existing shelter.

Finance: The financial report was circularised, explained and accepted.

Entrances and exits onto The Street will cause dangerous traffic problems. Infilling in The Street will effectively cut Folland Court (sheltered housing) off from the Village centre.

WVBS Wensum Valley Birdwatching Society

Our Christmas party went well. A special thanks to everyone who contributed to such a fine evening. The Treasurer's punch was excellent, lovely food, challenging, varied quizzes and convivial company.

Our most recent field trips were to Breydon Water in November and Lyndford Arboretum in December. Highlights at Breydon were a small group of Snow Buntings, a Little Egret and two Knot. At Lyndford we saw our 'target' bird the Hawfinch.

Feeding Garden Birds in the Winter: The winter months are particularly difficult for birds when their natural food sources become scarce. Birds can be fed household foods as well as specially bought food. The following advice is an extract from the RSPB leaflet, 'Feeding garden birds'.

Household Foods include bread, pastry (cooked or uncooked), cooked rice, bacon rind, fat, mild grated cheese, cold baked potatoes, dried fruits such as raisins and fruit such as apples, pears etc. Do not put out salty or highly seasoned foods. Bought Items include nut feeders, bird seed mixture, porridge oats, bird cake, peanuts and mealworms. Clean, fresh water is also very important. If freezing conditions are forecast, line the bird bath with a sheet of polythene, this will allow the ice to be easily removed.




