The story revolves around the troubled life, and death, of artist, Rachel Kelly. The "notes" are those written by the curator about works in her posthumous exhibition which prefix each chapter. The ensuing chapters then either transport the reader back to the time she created the work or reveal secrets from her past or jump to the present and follow her family as they come to terms with her death and reflect on their own lives and inadequacies.

Kelly is a trouble character suffering from bipolar disorder which results in her being totally self centred and not particularly likeable. Some felt the writer's choice of her condition a bit gratuitous.

Ongoing Issues from Previous Meetings

<u>Adams Pit:</u> Due to the current water level the planned excavation work was unable to commence in December. The contractors are monitoring the level weekly. With the potential of inclement weather and the urgency of this work the Trustees agreed that if the water level in the Pit has not reduced by early January, the Clerk would arrange for the contractors to pump out excess water until the level is satisfactory for contractor to commence.

Allotments: It is expected that the Chairman and Clerk will be meeting with the landowner who has a potential site for allotments along Elsing Lane early in the new year to discuss this possibility further and will provide an update at the February meeting.

Finance:

<u>Precept 2011-2012:</u> The budget for the forthcoming financial year was discussed and it was agreed that the Precept for 2011-2012 be set at £11,500, making it unchanged from this financial year. The Parish Council wished to reassure parishioners that it had done its utmost, despite an expected increase in expenditure for the new financial year, to ensure that there was no increase in the Precept for 2011-2012 given the current economic climate.

Wensum Valley Birdwatching Society

Trip to North Norfolk: started the day sea watching at Cley beach where unusually, a flock of about 15 Gannets were seen loafing on the sea and a small raft of Common Scoter forming a characteristic line three or four abreast in the slight swell. Also seen, a Velvet Scoter and a Red-throated Diver. Then on to North

Hide where two Grey Phalaropes, Black tailed godwits, Snipe and Ruff were spotted. Lunch at the Visitor Centre was followed by a search for an American Grey Plover thought to be in the area and patience was rewarded when it was spotted amongst a flock of Golden Plover. Then on to Dawkes Hide looking for a Green-winged Teal known to be present on the reserve and again the group struck lucky. A Curlew Sandpiper was also found on the scrape. Then finally on to Salthouse beach where Guillemot and a Black-throated Diver were seen near the shoreline. What a day! among the 56 species recorded for the day the group had seen some of the scarcer avian visitors to Norfolk. A really enjoyable day's birding and many thanks to Colin Fenn for leading the trip.


Dog Fouling in Bawdeswell

There has recently been an increase in the amount of Dog Poo left on our pavements and also on the Recreation Ground. This is extremely antisocial, is a nuisance and it's associated with various diseases including 'toxocare canis'. and dog owners are

urged to clear up after their pets or face possible consequences. If you see a dog fouling and it not being cleared up please speak to the person concerned and if necessary report them to Breckland Council.

People who do not clean up after their dog can be given a £50 on-the-spot fine. If they refuse to pay the fine, they can be prosecuted and may face a court appearance with a maximum penalty of £1,000.

Registered blind dog owners are exempt from penalties.

We still can't sell electrical goods; we need a qualified electrician to test them and, alas, we can't find one. Forgiveable, they're just too busy. But do try another charity shop rather than throw them away.

From the Rector

Dear Everybody, hello again,

Last month I went on a retreat to Alton Abbey in Hampshire. Three days without television or telephones (or emails or computers), the first prayers of the day at 6.30am, the last at 8.30pm, when the monks symbolically pulled their hoods up over their heads and entered into the "greater silence" of nobody speaking at all.

There's a lot of noise around us, coming at us from all sides. I looked up the words "television", "telephone" in my dictionary, and I had a surprise. These are words which were invented in order to describe a new invention. I knew that "telephone" meant "distant voice" in Greek, and "tele-vision" meant "distant" (Greek) "sight" (Latin). And there are words like "telemetry", "telekinesis", "telegraph" which have the same idea of something happening at a distance.

What I didn't know was that "tele-" in Greek with a long first "e" means "distant", but that "tele-" with a short first "e", the way we usually pronounce it, means "perfect", or "goal", or "end".

And it seems that we have a society in which for some people what was about things at a distance has become about what is perfect. Have you ever been in a shop when the person serving you says, "Excuse me", and picks up the ringing telephone? Or been bumped into in the street by someone who was texting on their mobile phone? When did what was at a distance become perfect, and invade our lives at the expense of those who were already there? It's as if we are so frightened of missing out on things "out there" that we don't notice what's close by.

Many religious traditions teach silent prayer and meditation. Techniques often include listening to your breath, or to the sound of your heartbeat in your ears, or to very quiet noises close by. And you don't have to be religious to benefit from sitting quietly and seemingly doing nothing — letting the quiet enfold you. If you do it intentionally, you'll find it isn't lonely. Every so often, turn off the noises out there that shriek for your attention. You may be surprised at what you hear.
