

In 1968, the Ford auto factory in Dagenham is one of the largest single private employers in the United Kingdom. In addition to the thousands of male employees, there are also 187 underpaid women machinists who primarily assemble the car seat upholstery in poor working conditions. Dissatisfied, the women, represented by the shop steward and Rita O'Grady, work with union rep Albert Passingham for a better deal. However, Rita learns that there is a larger issue in this dispute considering that women are paid an appalling fraction of the men's wages for the same work across the board on the sole basis of their sex. Refusing to tolerate this inequality any longer, O'Grady leads a strike by her fellow machinists for equal pay for equal work. What follows would test the patience of all involved in a grinding labour and political struggle that ultimately would advance the cause of women's rights around the world.

Digest of Minutes from meeting held 4th April 2011

Present: Councillors Shannon, Mason, Beane, Kirby, Mallen and Mrs Boer

Ongoing Issues from Previous Meetings

<u>Adams Pit</u>: No further progress has been made on Adams Pit since the last meeting, but Phase 3 of the refurbishment work will commence on or shortly after 5 April 2011, to take advantage of potential matched funding from Norfolk County Council.

<u>Possible Provision of Allotments:</u> The Chairman has e-mailed the Chairman of BALGA giving details of the Parish Council's perspectives on options available on land for allotments. The Chairman of BAGLA will discuss these options at the forthcoming BAGLA AGM and will then report their views to the Parish Council.

Planning Planning Application <u>3PL/2011/0280/F</u>: 29 Reepham Road, proposed single storey conservatory, the Parish Council has no objection to this application.

Any Other Business of Interest to Parishioners

<u>Fly-Tipping In Recycling Area:</u> The Chairman has received a number of complaints from residents about the continual fly-tipping of unapproved items in the recycling area. The Parish Council would like to remind residents that the recycling area is solely for the recycling of cans, bottles and textiles.

<u>Dog Litter</u>: The Parish Council has received a letter of complaint about dog-owners throwing plastic bags full of dog litter in the hedgerow along the public and private access roads leading to Bawdeswell Hall. Names of any alleged offenders should be forwarded to the Parish Council and Breckland Dog Warden. The Parish Council will consider siting another dog litter bin at the end of this road at its next Precept debate in December. In the meantime dog owners are reminded again that they should clear up after their pets and dispose of dog litter in the bins provided. Heavy fines can be imposed on any offenders. There are five dog litter bins situated around the village – grassed car park at the Garden Centre, entrance to Common Lane, Old Dereham Road, near the School, and Two Fields Way.

<u>Highways</u>: The Clerk was commissioned to report to Highways the poor state of the road surface at the junction of Norwich Road and the Street.

<u>Village Planters</u>: The Parish Council would like to thank Ms McColville and the other volunteers for all their sterling efforts in tidying up the village planters near the village sign. The Parish Council agreed to donate up to £60 towards some shrubs and materials to help finish this project and will now look into the possible refurbishment of the village sign.



Both were willing to continue in office & were duly re-elected. John Harvey will continue as Lay Vice – Chairman & Treasurer & has also taken over as the P.C.C 's Representative on the Deanery Synod. Nigel Hatch, who was thanked for his "sterling service" had attended the meetings over 9 years! Diana Harvey is still the Secretary, Monica Hatch is in charge of the Electoral Roll.

The Treasurer reported that the Finances were in a healthy state, due, principally, to some very generous donations & to committed regular giving by our worshippers, helped by the Government's Gift Aid Scheme. Mr. Harvey expressed thanks for these contributions; needless to say more funds will be needed to pay for the renovations (see below) that Dr. Rushbrook is master-minding; a very considerable challenge!

The Churchwardens mentioned again the invaluable services of John Fletcher, our organist & also in charge of the heating for 25 years; they wished him a speedy return to the keyboard after his recent ill-health. Thanks were also due to Vic Gathergood, our Groundsman, the church is now said by many to be in the best condition that they can remember! It's a lovely setting for our church in the centre of the village. Inside, Jayne Hough has again braved the chill to keep our ancient woodwork & floors clean & fresh, not to mention tackling the cobwebs! Our Flower Ladies, too, keep creating beautiful & imaginative arrangements.

The P.C.C. were grateful to June Vince for opening the church last summer **Foxley St. Thomas** & we are also joining the "Open Churches" week, 6^{th} -13th. August. We intend to bolster our attractions with some displays of local interest, in particular, our wonderful Hassocks, & by having a little stall to sell garden produce, jam etc.. On the final Saturday there will be an illustrated talk in the Village Hall – "History beneath your feet in Foxley", by Graeme Simmonds, an interactive demonstration of what unusual objects you might find when digging in your garden or plot.

Members, also, briefly considered the ongoing discussions in the Anglican Church, about the Consecration of women bishops. There will be a Benefice Meeting to air our, probably conflicting, views in the near future.

St Thomas' Foxley Church Restoration

The work goes on, extremely slowly, but in the right direction. We have now received 3 quotations for bell restoration after much chasing, but this will have to wait until we have raised the necessary funds and go through the approval process. The English Heritage Lottery fund indicated that providing funds to support bell ringing in Foxley for 13 local bell ringers was not good value for money at £117000, I have had to change tack and go for fund raising in a different way. However, the first tranche of bell ringers are still going, and even enjoying it. We are planning now for the second tranche. We will get there.

I have also found the missing Church Tower pinnacles (missing since 1986!) but we need to raise funds to have them back and erected.

At the moment we are in the last stages of approval for new heating system in the Chancel that will cost over £3000. That has taken 12 months! Unbelievable really but that is the pace it seems to move at. Hopefully we may have got that approval by the time this goes to print. One thing we have managed to do is repair an ancient Memorial slab in the Nave which was in pieces and now looks a whole lot better, as well as removing a safety hazard. The slab is of English black marble and must have weighed over a ton when it was replaced. The stone masons did a good job, but that set us back £1500. Church repair work is costly so any help to get through the myriad of projects we have to do to keep the building safe and in good repair, would be greatly appreciated.

From the Rector

Dear Everybody, hello again.

Depending on when you read this, we will either be about to have - or will have just had - a vote on how we vote. Do you prefer a first-past-the-post system, or AV, the alternative vote?

I think that the central reason lying behind most people's vote will be their temperament. There will be accusations flying round that people, on either side, don't understand the true issues; but in the end, people vote with their heart as much as their head, and with their loyalties.

What might they think the choice is? That it's between what is clearer or what is fairer? That it's between governments that can get things done or governments that only get things done that more people want? That it's between choosing who you most want or making sure you don't get who you least want?

So, what kind of temperament do you have? Do you like choice and compromise, or do you like simplicity and order? Do you miss the days when there were only four television channels with high quality programmes? Among the massive choice in a supermarket, do you always buy the same thing? When you go out with a group of friends, do you end up doing what the dominant ones want even if it's not the right thing for you, or do you compromise on second choices?

We live in a country where there are free and fair elections, and there are people, especially in the Arab world, who are fighting for precisely the rights that many Britons seem to despise. It's really too mentally lazy to say that all politicians are corrupt – it's like saying that all self-employed people are on the fiddle. It we find out that they're useless or shifty, it's up to us to get rid of them; but do let's be involved.

Christians are encouraged to be involved in the political process. We're responsible, whether we use our opportunities or not. A central principle in all Christian decision-making is an informed conscience: understanding as best you can; and then following your conscience, rather than choosing what benefits or gratifies you or your friends.
