BAWDESWELL FESTIVAL 2013



A spectacular and veritable cornucopia of events took place in Bawdeswell over the weekend of 14th-16th July. Right across the village things were happening from the Friday morning till the Sunday evening. This was the Bawdeswell Festival 2013.

The weekend was blessed with long hours of warm sunshine, which ensured that there was never a dull moment in any sense of the words.

The village hall hosted a magnificent heritage display of life in Bawdeswell through the ages. For those with long-standing connections with Bawdeswell, the numerous historical photographs will have evoked many a memory. Who can remember the post office in Reepham Road, for instance? Or the devastation caused after the Mosquito landed on the Victorian church? It was all there! Then there was the wonderful and riveting 35 minute film of Bawdeswell in times gone by, which provided many interesting facts and showed more fascinating historical pictures. All of this was the result of hundreds of hours' work done by Bill and Jackie Cunliffe. What they have achieved is the creation of a lasting archive of Bawdeswell history. The whole village, and indeed the wider community, is indebted to them. Whilst indulging in all the nostalgia, beverages and snacks were always on hand at the hall; a sterling effort was made by the volunteers who provided and served the appetising refreshments. The chocolate cake was as popular as ever!

A short walk from the village hall brought one to the church. Inside, the artistic talent of Bawdeswell had blossomed forth! Here was an exhibition of 31 unique and quite exceptional floral displays. The themes were varied and inspiring, and many focused on a Bawdeswell subject. Well done one and all, and particularly to Sue Lilwall and her team for undertaking the not inconsiderable task of planning and executing this bonanza of colour and creativity.

The atmosphere within the church was hugely enhanced by a succession of music recitals, which continued over the three days. The music was provided by a team of five organists including our own James Lilwall, and singer June Harrison who sang a selection of romantic songs on Sunday afternoon. Some were moved to tears by the

beauty of it. What better way to spend a contemplative half-hour than to sit and absorb the delights of sight and sound?

Outside the church were delights of a wholly different kind! A hog roast ensured that even the greatest appetites were sated. For those with a sweeter tooth there was no shortage in the selection of cakes on offer. Strawberries and cream completed the summer atmosphere. Congratulations go to the team of caterers who worked tirelessly to keep the goodies coming over the entire weekend.

A casual visitor to the village over the weekend could have been forgiven for thinking that the extravaganzas at the village hall and the church were the extent of the Festival. Not a bit of it! Thirteen private gardens were opened for visitors to roam and appreciate the surroundings within. Together with seven other sites in the village, such as the restored wild-life sanctuary at Adam's Pit and the recently-created Jubilee Garden, a whole day could be spent on an interesting tour of the village.

Shakespeare aficionados were in abundance to watch "A Mid-Summer Night's Dream", performed alfresco on the green in front of the church on the Saturday evening. More than one hundred people came, many of whom arrived early to enjoy a picnic and a glass or two of their favourite tipple in the pleasant evening air. The Festival Players were as professional as ever in their presentation of this well-known play. For this thespian experience we must thank Peter Jervis and his company, Quotatis, for their sponsorship.

Although not strictly part of the Festival, a Bawdeswell choir was vocally active at the Sunday evening service in the church. Even for non church-goers a visit to the church on that occasion would have been a sonorous treat.

Why all this activity and the reason for the Festival? All the hard work and preparation, which had been in hand by many people over many weeks, were in support of two important Bawdeswell icons, real and anticipated. One is here and now, the other is yet to come: the church building and the proposed new village hall.

The Festival can be considered a great success. Thanks are offered to all those involved, organisers and visitors alike.

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Persuasion by Jane Austen

With all thoughts of Pride and Prejudice banished, it was a very different heroine and hero in this book, although the genteel manners and nuances were as brilliant as ever.

The heroine, Anne, was the younger daughter of a junior aristocratic father who had many pretensions but no money to fulfil his ambitions in life. Indeed, he refused flatly to believe that he really was broke and must make economies – egged on by his elder, favourite daughter, much to Anne's horror. So he let the house reluctantly to an admiral, and went to Bath for the season with a 'companion' (supposedly for the favourite daughter), leaving the put upon Anne to pack up the house and sort everything out.

Anne had been very disappointed when a new romance had come into her life at 19, and her father had discouraged it on the advice of one of Anne's older lady friends, as the gentleman concerned, Mr Wentworth, was not good enough for her because he had no money. She took pleasure then in being the carer for all and sundry, and generally being put upon as 'Oh, Anne won't mind'. She was allowed few expressions of her true feelings, and kept her thoughts to herself.

However, during the stay in Bath, when she finally got there, her first love came back on the scene. Mr Wentworth was now Captain Wentworth, and very wealthy having travelled the world as a naval officer. The careful searching looks and exchange of words were difficult from the start, and Captain Wentworth gave the impression that he was looking elsewhere for a wife, even though he knew he had feelings for Anne. Due to an accident whilst staying with friends in Dorset, Captain Wentworth finds himself attracting the attentions of another young lady, so Anne departs for home disappointed yet again. By happy coincidence, the young lady who had the accident became attracted to one of Captain Wentworth's naval friends recently bereaved of his fiancée, and Captain Wentworth then went back to Bath, where he found Anne in the company of a young man who sought her acquaintance having seen her in the hotel in Dorset.

The attentions of this young man were in fact not honourable, it transpired, and were discovered to the detriment of himself, Anne's father and his 'companion'. Meanwhile, concerts and parties brought Anne and the Captain together, and eventually they were able to make their feelings known. The admiral and his kindly wife played a large part in the social scene, and brought the whole book together as a demonstration of the subtleties of Georgian manners.

We all enjoyed reading such brilliant descriptions of mood, behaviour and scenery – most of all the humour and wit of the characters that was so well displayed. (By the way, Ciaran Hinds played Captain Wentworth in the film: Colin Firth still wins!)

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


BAWDESWELL LADIES' CRAFT GROUP

THE BECK W. I.

We had a most interesting talk on Monday, 8yh July. Our speaker, Suzi Heybourne, currently Director of the Magdalen Group in Norwich, came to tell us something of the work they do to contact and help girls who, for various reasons, have chosen, or been pressurised, into the life of prostitution.

The Magdalen Group was founded by two magistrates 18 years ago and has now got national recognition. The staff and volunteers contact the girls by taking their vehicle into Norwich's red light area once a week. They freely chat to the girls, offer them hot chocolate and try to build a relationship. Developing a relationship obviously takes time but Suzi told us the case history of one or two of the girls and said how rewarding it was to be able to help them. The Rose Project, recently introduced, is proving most helpful. Staff and volunteers visit schools to meet and talk to the young people and the three Drop-Ins held every week are very popular.

After the coffee break, Christine read the Minutes of last month's meeting and Aleathia gave us details of future meetings and outings, including Holkham and Houghton. We welcomed two prospective new members, Pat and Jenny, and it was decided to award points to all those who brought a 'comforting item' as July's exhibit. Anne won the raffle.

Next month, 12th August, our speaker is Ian Howard and he will be telling us about 'The Magic of Woad'. The exhibit is Blue China.

BAWDESWELL PARISH COUNCIL DIGEST OF MINUTES OF THE MEETING HELD ON MONDAY 1st JULY 2013 AT 7.30pm INTHE PORTACABIN

Present: Councillors: Shannon DS (Chair), Mason WM (Vice Chair), Kirby AK, Lilwall JL, Mallen JM,

Bambridge GB (District Councillor), 2x PCSOs, and Mrs H Moore (Clerk) + 1 parishioner.

Ongoing issues from previous meetings:

Anti Social Behaviour: The PCSO reported that there have been no serious instances of ASB reported since the meeting. JM informed them that there have been instances of drug use at the recreation ground and the PCSO will visit more regularly to address this issue.

Proposed footpath to the Heath: AK informed the meeting that NCC had granted funding under the

Partnership Scheme for the two proposed locations, ie Dereham Road and Billingford Road. NCC will fund 75% of the costs and they require the remaining 25% due from the PC prior to the works being scheduled.

AK will arrange a meeting with James Winter of Highways and the adjacent land owners to determine what work needs to be done to prepare the area, in terms of cutting back hedges etc, and also to determine who will carry out and fund this work. Generous donations have been pledged towards the footways and it is

hoped that those that pledged may agree to some of these funds being used towards maintenance such as

hedge cutting, if necessary. The footways will be a grass surface and as such will need regular maintenance.

Highways will carry out two cuts per year. The PC will consider funding further cuts, should the need arise.

Both the Dereham Road and Billingford Road options will be pursued for now. However, it was noted that the Dereham Road option appears to be the most important one in terms of safety.

Any Other Business of Interest to Parishioners:

Cemetery: Following concerns raised by parishioners, a new contractor has been commissioned to cut the area fortnightly. The area is already greatly improved and the hedges are also due to be cut soon.

Village Hall Committee and Project Bawdeswell News:

Car Park: Currently there are planings ready to be used to improve the car park surface. However, more planings need to be purchased to enable a willing contractor to be able to carry out the work. The cost will be in the region of £1,500. DS proposed that the Village Hall Committee use the precept money of £900allocated for CCTV (if the Village Hall Committee agree), plus an additional £400 from the PC contingency fund, plus the balance remaining in the precept allocation for car park/driveway maintenance (£70), plus the balance remaining from the precept allocation towards the

churchyard trees (£225). This gives a total of £1595. All were in agreement. JL will seek agreement from the Village Hall Committee and then give the go ahead to the contractor.

New Hall Project: JL had circulated a paper regarding the New Village Hall Project. The report details the fact that the hall is currently breaking even, with a contingency of £3,000 which has to be kept as part of good governance in the eyes of the Charity Commission. Lots of communication is still happening with the Lottery

which is encouraging and preparations are underway for Stage 3. George Freeman MP will be visiting on the 22nd July at 5.30pm. The Festival and Extravaganza are approaching which are good fundraising opportunities. DS voiced concerns that the driveway and car park are currently not being looked at within the project. It was decided that there will be a working collaboration between the PC, Project Bawdeswell and the Village Hall Committee to look at the car park and driveway. A design specification needs to be created and funding sought to fill this gap in the project. JL noted he is happy that a way forward has been found.

Project Bawdeswell: DS gave a vote of thanks to AK for carrying Project Bawdeswell forward and confirmed that the PC will support her with it. AK reported that there has been a recent PB meeting where the vision was revisited and discussed. The focus is to be young children, teenagers, mature people, heritage and business. One member is to set up an English study group to help with homework. Volunteers for a Maths

group are welcomed. The school support the idea. The bigger children swings are being looked at along with the cricket nets and a shelter. Rough quotes for the swings and a shelter have been received. The swings

quote is for £2,300, including £800 on matting. The shelter quote is £8,000 for a hexagon, open sided shelter

made of wood. There is a grant available via the EDP Lottery Fund which closes on the 14th July. It was

agreed that the PC authorise AK pursue bidding for this available funding, on behalf of the PC, with a view to using it for the shelter. The current available play area funds could then be used for the swings. More quotes will be sought.

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Legal Corner

The procedure for setting up Lasting Powers of Attorney (LPA) is relatively complicated but, in my view, there are good reasons for it.

Before an LPA is effective it must be registered with the government body that keeps a track of these things, the Office of the Public Guardian. Its existence can be verified and checked up on by that body if necessary. With Enduring Powers of Attorney, they are so simple to create that they skip under the radar and you are therefore potentially more vulnerable.

When you sign an LPA someone must provide a certificate to confirm that you have mental capacity to create the document, that you're not being pushed into making it against your will and that you understand the full scope of what your attorneys can do on your behalf. This is particularly where we as solicitors can come in handy as by specialising in this area of work, we can give that necessary certificate. It is only in relatively rare cases where we can't tell if someone truly understand and we then have to refer it on to a mental health specialist.

In addition, when you create an LPA you must nominate one person to be notified of its creation. They then get sent a notice just before the registration that you're going ahead and registering the LPA. You can choose up to five people for this role if you like. You are not allowed to notify someone who is already mentioned in the LPA but it can be anyone else you trust. Their role is to shout up if they think there are any justifiable reasons to question or stop the registration of the LPA.

The method of creating and running an LPA isn't bullet-proof. However, I hope with these extra levels of protection that people will feel a little more secure in the knowledge that a Lasting Power of Attorney is more reliable than the slightly more vulnerable Enduring Power of Attorney system.

The alternative view is that all of these changes are simply 'Big Brother' wanting to know what's going on! Whatever your views, hopefully you will agree that sharing information with the people closest to you, those you trust the most, (so that they can help you when you need them) must be a good thing.

Wensum Valley Birdwatching Society

There was no indoor meeting in June, but to make the most of the summer evenings we held two outdoor evening meetings. On 5th June around 30 members assembled in the centre of Dereham for a stroll around Scarning water Meadows. It was a surprise to most of us that there was a reserve so close to the centre of the town, and this visit was led by Trevor and Wendy Brown, who have been much involved in the preservation of this special place. Our first impression was of a froth of cow parsley covering the whole of the meadows, although paths had been mown through the waisthigh flowers. As we wandered through, several greenfinches posed for us in the sunshine, and we enjoyed watching a number of busy whitethroats. There were splendid views of water voles in the river running through the middle of the reserve, and the sharp-eyed among us spotted bullfinch and turtle doves flying through.

Our second evening meeting at Marsham Heath was specially to look for nightjars, specialist insect feeders that are most active at dawn and dusk. The first sign that they were present was the distinctive 'churring' song, rising and falling as the bird turns its head. We were lucky enough to watch a male in flight, hunting for moths from its perch in a nearby tree.

We ended the month with a very successful all day visit to RSPB Minsmere and to Dunwich Heath. The weather was kind to us and we had not only some sun but some warmth! Minsmere is a large reserve with lots of different habitats, ranging from reedbeds and scrapes (shallow pools) to woodland and open fields, and with the heathery heathland of Dunwich Heath it isn't surprising that the group saw over 80 species of birds. Among the highlights were very close views of two bitterns, prowling and fishing in the reeds just below a hide while four hobbies flew around us catching dragonflies and occasionally perching on nearby skeleton trees. A red deer was browsing along the track at the same time. We didn't know where to look first! Earlier we had been treated to views of a family of young bearded tits flitting across the reeds, and now we also had really close views of a perfect adult male. The scrapes had provided us with a good variety of gulls, including the beautiful Mediterranean gull, and waders, including a group of spotted redshanks, the darkest of wading birds. We topped off a magnificent day's birding with a short walk on the heath, where we saw at least four pairs of Dartford warblers. A truly excellent day.



From the Rector

Dear Everybody, hello again.

There has been a highly publicised piece of research recently. Apparently, if you're an optimist, you live on average seven and a half years longer than if you are a pessimist. So not only do you enjoy your life, you have more of it to enjoy, so the research says.

Once again there is a survey that seems to blame us for what happens to us. We know that this is almost invariably not the case. Dreadful things happen to optimistic people as well as pessimists. All of us go through life's trials and tragedies. Some of us are more resilient than others, and bounce back more quickly. Being cheerful may keep you going, but it doesn't change what you're going through.

I would imagine, also, that those who have had an unfair dose of life's ills would tend to be more pessimistic. We get trained by our experience. But the question that was asked was: do we experience more things as bad if we aren't looking for what is good?

If you grumble about the weather being too hot (how often is that?), do you really believe it, or are you just beginning a conversation with somebody? Sometimes looking pessimistic is just a British pose, rather than what is deep inside us. Comedians often have a line in being self-deprecating; it's an easy target to pick on yourself, that way you don't offend anybody.

Optimism is more than just rejoicing in what is good, though sometimes we need to train ourselves to look for even that. Optimism is *expecting* what is good. Sometimes the things that happen to us to thwart our plans can turn out for the best.
