

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
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Feb Half Term at the Hall



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Past Imperfect - a novel by Julian Fellowes.

Past Imperfect is a novel about time and what time invariably does to us all. A very rich man is dying and has received an anonymous letter from an ex girlfriend. She suggests that as a young man he may have fathered a child. He, slightly implausibly the group felt, persuades an ex- friend, now a sworn enemy, to investigate whether any of the sexual conquests of his youth resulted in such a love child.

The action of his youth centred upon the debutante season of 1968 with its lavish balls and parties. He is an outsider, not from the privileged backgrounds of the debutante set, but is curious to examine their lifestyles. The debutantes' other suitors see his confident suave style as gauche and dangerous but he excites and intrigues several of the debutantes.

The story slowly unfolds leading to a momentous evening of revelation in a holiday villa in Portugal, a scene that has been alluded to throughout the story. It was this element of the story that some members found particularly implausible and perhaps destroyed the credibility of the story.

Overall, the book generated some discussion but there were differences of views concerning the style of writing and content. So maybe a 5 out of 10 book?

We met on 4th January but not many of us had managed to finish <u>Cloud Atlas</u> by David Mitchell but having now finished it and spoken with others that have I would highly recommend it as a most unusual novel; written by six different characters covering the past, present and future with language appropriate to the time and the writers, it is very creative. There are tenuous connections between the different protagonists but they are not obvious and merely hinted at. I would recommend it with the proviso to stick with it for the first 100 pages or so.

BAWDESWELL PARISH COUNCIL DIGEST OF MEETING HELD ON 3rd DECEMBER 2012

Present: Councillors Shannon, Mason, Beane, Kirby, Lilwall, Mallen, Mr G Bambridge (District Councillor), PCSO Charli Stone, Mrs H Moore (Clerk) and four parishioners.

Ongoing Issues from Previous Meetings

Possible Pedestrian Access to the Heath: Councillor Kirby is awaiting costings from NCC Highways for constructing a footpath.

Folland Court: The final stage of the transfer of land is still awaited. Once in place, the land will become part of the Old Surveyors' Trust. The garden is now complete and is seen as a great success.

<u>Possible Work on Churchyard Trees:</u> A survey of all the trees in the Churchyard is being commissioned, following which any necessary work will be put out to tender.

<u>Condition of Common Lane:</u> Highways have carried out work to fill the potholes, as requested, but some low lying points are still filling with water so more repairs will be requested.

<u>Bus Service Requirements:</u> Two representatives from Norfolk County Council Transport will attend the meeting on Monday 4th February 2013 to discuss the possibility of improving bus services to and from the village. Representation by villagers at that meeting will be essential if we are to convince NCC to meet our needs, so please come along if you can.

Other Business of Interest to Parishioners

Village Hall: The Village Hall Committee is writing a new constitution to clarify ownership and aid fund raising. Project Bawdeswell is now focusing on the creation of facilities and activities for young people to raise their aspirations improve their employment prospects and help them integrate into the community.

Anti-Social Behaviour: After some persuasion, Norfolk Police have agreed to keep Bawdeswell on the priority list for high visibility policing until the end of January 2013, and PCSO Stone confirmed that Section 59 sanctions, including confiscation of vehicles, could be imposed in the case of repeat offences. However, the Police cannot act against anti-social behaviour unless parishioners report **all** such incidents, preferably by dialling 101 straight away. So, please help us to help the Police combat these problems.

<u>Precept</u>: In discussing the financial requirements for 2013/14 the Council endeavoured to keep the Precept as low as possible, recognising the current financial pressures on households. However, pressing priority needs in the village, including improving security around the Village Hall and temporary repairs to the adjacent car park, is likely to require an additional £1,300 over and above the normal expenditures. Other sums agreed included £500 for Project Bawdeswell, £1000 to the New Hall Fund, and an extra £100 to the Church as a third share towards the recent purchase of a new disabled access ramp. The Council, in principle, agreed the Precept should be raised to £15,000, but this figure will not be finalised until January, once Breckland have announced how the expected council tax relief changes will come into effect.

<u>Future Meeting Times</u>: It was decided that from January 2013 onwards, all meetings will commence at 7.30pm, rather than 7.45pm.

The Committee met on 22^{nd} December and covered subjects from the Constitution to Security! A new Constitution in line with the Charities' Commission requirements is being drafted. The Police have prepared a report on security at the Hall and recreation ground. The recommendations are being considered by the Village Hall Committee and the Parish Council. Unfortunately the perpetrator of the break-in and entering on 11^{th} November has not been identified although the police interviewed several people and are continuing to monitor the building. The broken window will be repaired shortly.

Father Christmas made a big effort to be at the Hall on 16^{th} December but unfortunately only a few families managed to come and see him. We hope he will get more of a welcome next Christmas.

Members of the committee have recently met with the architects and an open meeting will be held as soon as possible when the architects will table detailed plans for the internal layout of the hall. A second stage 1 outline application has been made to the Big Lottery and we expect a response from them by the end of January. If not we will have a last chance to re-submit a re-written stage 1 application in 3 months, but fingers crossed that won't be necessary!

Wensum Valley Birdwatching Society

Indoor Meeting 15 November – Birding in Ethiopia by Allan Hale

It is amazing how many of the birds can be seen around the hotels, even if it is a tented hotel in the middle of nowhere with primitive facilities. Arrival was in a very modern airport in Addis Ababa but there are two sides to that city – the modern face and the very poor, older areas, as with most of the country. The countryside is so dry apart from the few yards either side of water or on the higher slopes of the mountains where you start to see green. What a lot of birds have amazingly long tails! We saw superbly coloured Starlings, Black Kites which are associated with 'death and squalor'. Several birds which visit our own country were seen, emphasising how far some of them travel. Some gorgeous birds, the Spur-winged Plover, the Bee-eaters to name but two. Imagine a Kingfisher as small as a Blue Tit – the Malachite Kingfisher; then we were shown an even smaller one – the African Pygmy Kingfisher. The Honey Guide birds that lead the locals to honey; they always leave some for the birds. We had a thoroughly enjoyable evening with much laughter as our speaker was one of our own members.

Outdoor 25 November After a very windy and wet night, a few stalwarts met at RSPB Strumpshaw Fen. A short visit with several woodland birds – Marsh Tit, Treecreeper – also Marsh Harrier and a singing Cetti's Warbler before we shot off to Great Yarmouth to see Mediterranean Gulls. More specifically we were interested in those birds which had rings on. We saw Med Gulls which had been ringed in Belgium, Holland and Denmark. Then onto Sea Palling for a spot of sea-watching; Guillemot, Razor Bill, Common Scoter and Eider Duck were seen. Our final venue for the day, which had now turned bright and sunny, was Stubbs Mill for the evening raptor roost. Glorious evening sunset: many Marsh Harriers, several Hen Harriers, three or four Barn Owls ended what had turned out to be a really good day's birding.

Legal Corner by Ruth Collings

I suspect that most people consider that wills are for those who are getting on in years. It is true that the average life expectancy is going up and up but within that figure there are many people who die too young.

One of the first things that can trigger the need to make a will is when you have your first child. A child is inherently going to be dependant on you as a parent and needs to be appropriately provided for after your death. This is true for many adult children but is particularly true for those who are under the age of 18 years. In your will you can arrange for your assets to be put into a trust that is looked after for your child or children until they reach adulthood.


Importantly, in your will you can also nominate who should become a legal guardian of any child you have who is under the age of 18 years. This could be a family member or a friend – anyone you feel your child would be happy with and who is responsible enough to look after your child on a day to day basis.

If you should die while you have children who are under 18 years of age and make a will appointing a legal guardian, you can also make some financial provision for the guardians if you wish. The purse-strings of the trust funds for your children are held by your executors and trustees. If the guardian needs to be reimbursed for the expenses they incur in looking after your children they would apply to your executors and trustees for funds.

However, all these arrangements can only be made in your will. If you don't make a will and your assets pass according to the intestacy rules, no legal guardian is appointed and no provision can be made (after your death) for the expenses your guardian will have in raising your children. So it isn't by any means just people who are older who need to make a will.

Next time I'll be explaining a little about powers of attorney and what they are useful for.

From the Rector

Dear Everybody, hello again.

Easter is early this year, so Lent begins (with Ash Wednesday) on February 13th. Traditionally, Christians give things up for Lent. If it's just about food, that may look a bit negative; but read any recent diet fad, and the physical benefits of fasting, regularly but not every day, are noticeable. Our bodies are designed to have periods of doing without.

It's not just food we can do without. All of us can also do without some of the more damaging emotions that we express to others. This is about paying attention to ourselves and why we feel our ego is so important, and thinking about the feelings of others. Lent is a time when Christians are encouraged to think about what we have done wrong, and, hopefully, are prompted to ask for forgiveness.

One tragedy unfolding today is the civil war in Syria; tens of thousands of lives lost, millions displaced from their homes. There is a problem of forgiveness at the very centre of the behaviour of the Syrian president. He looks across at Iraq, where Saddam Hussein was strung up after his trial. He thinks of Libya, where Muammar Gaddafi was murdered by his captors. So what possible incentive does Bashar Assad have to go quietly? He is a man who will probably die when he loses.

People who are "painted into a corner", or who are desperate, often carry on doing unreasonable things, knowing they are unreasonable, because they cannot see what else to do. But the more there is a way out, the more likely people are to change.

Forgiveness is a kind of giving up. It's giving up your right to be angry. If we forgive others, it will cost us some effort, in the way that fasting does. It may also, like fasting does physically, clear some space for us to be emotionally fitter. The outcome of your forgiving others may be that they have time and space to change, so it may be of advantage to you as well; but that's not the only reason why you do it.

Christians in Lent, meditating on forgiveness, think about it as the freedom to be better. May forgiveness be a healing force for us all.
