Saturday 8th June 7pm

Hyde Park On Hudson (12A)

Bill Murray as FDR, the estimable Laura Linney as Daisy. Olivia Williams as the formidable Eleanor Roosevelt, Samuel West as King George V1 and Olivia Colman as Oueen Elizabeth. This is a cast to die for and a fascinating film, made in the actual locations where the events took place. In the mid 30s, Daisy Stuckley ran into her sixth cousin (then the famed US President) and they fell in love and apparently had an idvllic relationship. Then the King and Oueen of England come to stay at the President's Hudson Valley house during their famous visit to the USA in Spring 1939 and everything falls apart.

Saturday 6th* July 7pm (* 1st Saturday) Lincoln (12A)

Epic and reverential bio-pic from Steven Spielberg with a central performance by Daniel Day Lewis that sweeps all before it. Important also to mention Sally Field as Lincoln's wife and the meticulous work that has gone into recreating 19th century Washington DC. Better received in the USA than over here but still a good piece of film-making from Spielberg who has generally avoided the clichés and produced a compelling portrait of a complicated man.

Saturday 10th August 7pm Hitchcock (12A)

In 1959, Alfred Hitchcock and his wife, Alma Revill, are at the top of their creative game as filmmakers amid suggestions from some critics about it being time to retire. To recapture his youth's artistic daring, Alfred decides his next film will adapt the lurid horror novel, Psycho, over everyone's misgivings. Unfortunately, as Alfred selffinances and works on this film, Alma finally loses patience with his roving eye and controlling habits with his actresses. Anthony Hopkins as Hitchcock and Helen Mirren as Alma.

Sarah Gowan, formerly of Paradise Road in Bawdeswell, celebrated her 100th Birthday on 28 April.

When she first came to Bawdeswell she lived in the Ram Inn, now The Willows, next to the old chapel.

Later she lived in Foxley and North Elmham and finally moved back to Bawdeswell when a new bungalow became available in Paradise Road.

After her husband died, her son Fred and his wife Betty moved in and looked after her. She is now 100 years old and in East Bilney Hall.

Her memories include a village post office, Lamberts greengrocers, Hudson butchers, bakery, shoe repair shop, the village petrol pump and blacksmiths, carpenter, Ram Inn, Bell Inn, destroyed church, Nurse Bugdale, village policeman in the police house, Folland the cycling vicar, youth club, dancing and boxing classes, film shows in the old village hall, football, cows where Church Close is now and a slaughter house!

Although I only moved to this village some 9 years ago, I was so pleased to be welcomed into the community that I wanted to give something back, and so I joined in to the best of my ability, serving on the Parish Council and helping out where I could on projects such as the refurbishment of Adam's Pit as a conservation area, the creation of the Folland Court Jubilee Garden, and recreational improvements in and around the Village Hall. However, having seen the attitude and actions of a small minority within our community, I have to say that I am now on the brink of giving up! The latest straw to break this camel's back has been the wanton destruction around Adam's Pit and the resulting abuse of the sterling efforts of a few community-minded volunteers to make this area something to be proud of. Today, 27^{th} April, I not only had to pick up the detritus of someone's picnic litter, but also had to witness the after effects of some vandal's efforts to dig up wildflowers and leave holes around the seat which I personally built! This person can collect his/her trowel and gardening gloves from me, if they so wish, but I suggest that they are put to better use than the destruction of other people's hard work!

I have a similar message for the parents of those youngsters who in recent weeks have built fires on and around the basketball court, smeared the kiddies' play equipment with obscene graffiti, broken expensive windows in the Village Hall, and who have treated the front of the Shop as a lavatory. Parents - if you don't know what your offspring do of an evening in Bawdeswell – you should do!

And to all of those engaged in anti-social pursuits within the village, I would simply ask them to grow up and learn to respect rather than abuse the society they live in.

BOOK CLUB

Beowulf translated by Seamus Heaney

Beowulf is epic poem in Old English written down around 1,000 years ago – although it would have existed as an oral tradition for some time before this. The poem is over 3,000 lines long and has a rhythmic quality, using repetition of sounds and letters to great effect.

The poem is set in the sixth-century in southern Sweden and Denmark and is told from a (later) Christian perspective. The hero of the story is *Beowulf* who is a great warrior and becomes a good king. His battles with Grendel (a monster from the dark) and then Grendel's revengeful mother are legendary. These monsters terrorised a neighbouring kingdom and Beowulf and a band of warriors sailed to their aid. Fifty years later, in his old age, Beowulf engages in his final battle with a dragon threatening his own people.

The poem is not all about fighting and portrays wonderful scenes. It starts with the funeral of a king in a treasure-laden ship and has other descriptions of hoards (including Beowulf's own mound burial after being slain by the dragon). The picture of Anglo Saxon life that is depicted, especially in the main hall with formal mead-drinking, songs and poems by minstrels and the reward of valour with gifts is vivid. It ends with Beowulf's funeral and the uncertainty that his people face in the future. The importance of family and kinship, honour and the triumph of good over evil are celebrated.

It has been suggested that the poem may have been composed during the reign of Aelfwald, an East Anglian king who reigned from 713 to 749 and was the last king of the Wuffingas dynasty associated with Sutton Hoo in Suffolk. Burial mounds like those at Sutton Hoo (especially the ship burial) and the treasure that was found there resonate throughout the poem.

The only surviving manuscript of *Beowulf* is held by the British Museum. It probably dates from the late 10th or early 11th century and is written in the language spoken in Anglo-Saxon England at the time (before the Norman Conquest in 1066). The manuscript may have been associated with King Cnut (ruler of England from 1016-1035).

The similarity with some of the imagery and tales in Lord of the Rings cannot be ignored. Professor R.R. Tolkien was a scholar of medieval literature who lectured extensively on Beowulf and admitted that the poem influenced own work.

The version that we read is by Seamus Heaney (Nobel Laureate in Literature) who won the Whitbread Book of Year Award in 1999 for this translation. His poetic sensibilities and love of language enhance the poem and make strong links to a shared heritage as well as being a pleasure to read. JB



The minutes of the last Annual Foxley Parish Council Meeting held on the 10th May 2012 were agreed and signed

Chairmans Report:

Our usual pattern of five meetings in any one year, was unavoidably extended by having to wait for the final word from Breckland (who in turn had been waiting on Central Government), in case our Parish Precept might be affected. In the event, we settled for an unchanged sum of £4,300. We have had all the usual niggling problems of litter, dog fouling, messy street potholes & broken road barrier. These last highway matters have not been helped by the shortage of funding; we have had to accept whatever priorities the County decides.

The two main Planning applications have been: 1) Retirement bungalows on a green field site; declined on basis of being outside the established Settlement Boundary and 2) Five dwellings on the Old Natterjack site, where four were thought to be enough, as replacement for knocking the pub down, when outline planning was first considered. This is still the view of some councillors and we know of near residents of similar opinion. There is also the matter of the importance of maintaining the ditch fronting the site as well as keeping clear drainage along the northern boundary. At the time of writing, we are awaiting Breckland's decision.

There have been three major events (at least they are in are small way of things!), since I last reported: First was the Queen's Diamond Jubilee on 2nd June, marked by a BBQ & games on a day of indifferent weather! Secondly, the commissioning and erection of a new village sign. One of our number thought it should not fail as a cost put upon every household via the Parish Precept and quickly raised promises to the amount required. This was seemingly a good idea, but I do apologise to those who have felt "left out" and who are upset at not being approached for a contribution. I am sorry that the final act of "formal opening" was arranged in too short a time for everyone to hear about it. The sign is carved from a solid piece of oak and clearly depicts the animal responsible for half our village name and bluebells for which are wood is famous! I commend this and successive clerks/councillors/parishioners to keep an eye on the sign to ensure it is regularly cleaned and maintained. Thank you to Mr & Mrs Kelvin Thatcher for their distinctive artwork. The third major matter for the village, though it does not come within the remit of this council, is the refurbishment of the church bells- about which, you will hear much more later!! Just warning you all! I wish to convey my warmest thanks to your hard working Parish Clerk; we all know in our personnel dealings with various organisations, just how difficult & tiring it can be to get them to respond and DO something! She liaises & chases where necessary, but with the added burden of being told "there is no money" as an excuse thrown in! Also, thanks to my colleagues for their support & time freely given on your behalf. We still need another councillor. Will one of you not volunteer, please? And, we are in need of more drivers for the car

scheme. Thank you Gordon Bambridge for much advice as our District Councillor; who, even tonight, when Bawdeswell are also meeting, will be (is) at both! Much valued. And finally, thanks to Bill Borrett, whose attendance is inevitably limited on account of his big responsibility at County level. Perhaps Ukip will take some of the work off his shoulders/! We know his help & advice are readily available, if needed. Finally, and sorry to end on a sad note, I just ask you to remember the late Bill Evans & kindness in arranging the cleaning of the War Memorial last Autumn. Also, to remember the late Henry Durham, who gave time to the village matters, some while before we arrived, therefore at least twenty two years ago. Mr Harvey then passed around a framed photograph of the new Village Sign, which he hoped the VHC would accept and hang in the Village Hall. Mr Harvey congratulated the VHC for another successful year.







It is also the time of year when the churchwardens who have been elected or re-elected at the parish meetings are summoned to be admitted to office by the archdeacon. The office of churchwarden of a parish has existed for many centuries and, although the elections take place in each parish, the successful candidates are not legally in post until after the admission service. So now Robin and I are legal again! This year the service was at St Michael's, Aylsham and, unusually, the bishop was present. Indeed, not just one bishop but two - Graham, Bishop of Norwich, and Jonathan, Bishop of Lynn. Bishop Graham addressed us and talked about the growth that we have seen in the Diocese in recent years. In particular, he talked about youth work: the church has significantly increased the number of youth workers it employs while at the same time the county has ceased to employ any; church schools are flourishing and providing a Christian foundation for the next generation. The church is not just about Sunday mornings and formal worship, although that is still important. The wider effort is bearing fruit and deserves our support.

It was a pleasure to see the church full for the delightful Ivor Novello evening organised by the Friends of Bawdeswell Church. We are very grateful for all the support which the Friends continue to give us.

St Thomas Church Foxley

The bells are back- in the tower and named after the 6 Saints of St Thomas' Church. We had a very pleasant blessing service led by David Head, which many from the local community attended.

It was also pleasing to see the primary school children from Bawdeswell there who had taken up hand bell ringing. They put the name labels on the 6 bells.

The bell names are Ambrose, Augustine, Gregory, Jerome, Thomas the Apostle, and Thomas a Beckett ,the martyr. We managed to get 5 bells hoisted up in the tower that afternoon. It has taken three weeks of hard labour to do the rest of the work.

Today, May 9th, these bells were rung up - the tenor having been silent since 1952 the others pretty well since 1984. My thanks go to all the volunteers who have worked tirelessly since January 7th. The bells await acceptance testing by Taylors but today at 4.00pm each bell sounded again.

Once we are through the acceptance testing the Foxley band will be able to ring at services and at a weekly practice at 730pm on a Wednesday evening to 900pm. There may be other odd times when the bells are rung during the day but we hope the village will enjoy the sound again after all this time.

When the bells have settled down we will have a dedication service to inaugurate them. It has been a long journey, with many significant technical and funding issues overcome through the efforts of local people, but through their efforts we have secured a bit more of Foxley's heritage for future generations.

Dear Everybody, hello again.

Sometimes simple things are the best. Simple explanations, simple diagrams. They let you understand things so much more quickly.

One of the complaints about the previous Archbishop of Canterbury was that he made things sound complicated. However right he may have been, there was no point in him being right if people couldn't understand. I could follow his arguments so far, and then I found I had lost concentration, and that was it. I didn't always get the central idea.

Scientists talk about "elegant" solutions; until people worked out that the planets went round the sun, the paths that they thought the planets took were really complicated. A simple new idea, and everything fits much more neatly. Sometimes we have to learn a lot, in order to have the simple idea that makes everything truly fall into place.

Sometimes things are over-simplified. The media give us sound-bites that grab the attention, only to insult the intelligence. It is as if they think we can't think things through, and don't deserve detail. Or as if we'd prefer journalists sounding clever, rather than knowing the truth.

Is there a happy medium? I get booklets with tiny print from my bank that look as though they are saying something really complicated but are actually saying something simple: "We're going to take more of your money, but we're going to make it your fault for not realising because you gave up on reading this booklet." And I have a feeling that a simple "in-out" vote on Europe will need a great deal of explaining.

Some things can't be explained simply: for instance, some bits of Christian doctrine, the off-side rule, why mathematical equations fill the length of a blackboard, how a mechanical clock works, what is happening to the climate. But because things are complicated, it doesn't mean that they are incorrect. One of the hardest things to explain is people; but we're worth thinking about.
