At around Midnight Tues night/Wed morning 12th/13th February, the McColls store in Bawdeswell was the subject of a burglary, whereby the three suspects forced open the front doors by jemmying the hinges off.

They made good their escape but were arrested a short time later in Kings Lynn. They had apparently already burgled the Jet Garage at Middletons Lane in Drayton.

After their arrest the three suspects were also charged with other offences including a house burglary at Fakenham in December.

All three, Nelson Loveridge, Blossom Smith and John Smith, come from the Fens and are in custody and due to appear in court on 19th February.

McColls staff had to close the stores the following morning in order that Police scenes of crime officers could do their work. It was a very cold morning and our thanks go to the staff members who stood outside selling the newspapers they know we look forward to reading.

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
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In Love with Alma Cogan and Gambit

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BOOK CLUB



The Spy Who Came in from the Cold by John le Carré

It is 50 years since John le Carré published *The Spy Who Came in from the Cold* and Europe is a different place now, in an electronic world, changed 'enemies' and no Berlin Wall. It was his third novel and was immediately successful both as a novel, and a film starring Richard Burton.

The novel is of its time and yet has not become outdated. Le Carré's writing style is accessible and spare; every word counts and every part of the story is there for a reason, even if it seems insignificant at the time. He manages to convey physical surroundings, emotion and atmosphere with a few well-chosen words. Greyness and coldness, especially in the London and Berlin of the early 1960s and the Cold War resonate through the book.

Le Carré does not manipulate his readers (or at least he ensures that they remain unaware) and avoids narrative fireworks. Instead the reader is introduced to an entirely believable world where moral certainties are obscured, populated by characters who are recognisable and credible. In this book and throughout other novels, Le Carré shows that the techniques employed to maintain democracy are morally no different to those used by eastern European at the time.

The central character, Alec Leamas, is a tired, drab, cynical individual who ran a network in Berlin that was exposed and destroyed, and for which he feels guilt. He is a very experienced British spy who understands how the game works and his role within it. The duplicity of secret service life underpins the novel, where loyalty to one's country/ideology separates one from 'normal' human interaction. Generally mundane operations and surveillance are counterpointed by the risks that players take and the ever-present likelihood of betrayal.

The novel begins and ends at the Berlin wall with attempts to cross from East Berlin to the west. Leamas succeeds in coming in from the cold by finally putting his humanity to the fore, at the expense of ultimate failure of coming in from the cold to his spy masters.

John le Carré is a truly accomplished writer whose works are always worth reading and some (of which this is one) stand up to re-reading time and time again.

District Councillor Gordon Bambridge made his apologies at the meeting because he had to depart at 8pm., therefore all items involving Councillor Bambridge were discussed first, however for the purpose of the minutes, items recorded in order to reflect agenda.

<u>Minutes of the Extraordinary Meeting</u> The minutes of the Extraordinary meeting held on the 10th January were agreed and signed.

Matters Arising not Covered Elsewhere on Agenda

Highways

Concerns were raised about the state of the verges along the Old Fakenham Road towards the School; someone is cutting up the verges with their vehicle for what anyone can describe as mindless fun. Clerk to contact Police.

The Clerk is also going to arrange a meeting with Highways to discuss several issues concerning Foxley.

Potholes and surface water along Chapel Road East, which is freezing and is causing dangerous driving conditions.

A parishioner has also enquired if it would be possible to install another grit bin at Chapel Road East; this was refused by Highways last time when locations were discussed with Richard Fletcher. Action Clerk

Also after the sewerage works at The Street the area around the post box has accumulated mud and water and needs clearing up.

Clerk to contact Highway Rangers.

The verge outside a property at Chapel Road East has been damaged by the Brown Bin collection lorry this item will also be reported to the Highway Rangers.

Planning

3PL/2012/1124/F 4 Mill Road granted with 8 conditions.

3PL/2013/0075/O AND 3PL/2013/0076/O 2 single storey dwellings on land between Cyncoed and Holly Trees. The Parish had a lengthy discussion on this application. The land in question is the field between Cyncoed and Holly Trees which is outside the Boundary Settlement. The main concern is if this planning application was approved, then it would open up the flood gates for land owners surrounding Foxley to do the same. Foxley as a whole has no amenities to cope with extra housing. The only way that this application would be approved by Breckland is if it was an exceptional case as Gordon Bambridge, pointed out. He is hoping that it will be discussed at the

planning committee at Breckland, which is an open meeting; they will have to take notice of this application as the applicants have over 75% of the village behind them from a petition they put together themselves. If the case is good enough this needn't open the way for more housing surrounding Foxley but help two families in their twilight years to remain in Foxley a place which they consider their home, and presently both live close by. Therefore 2 Councillors objected to the application and 2 Councillors abstained. The Council policy is to support the CP14 guidelines. Other proposed development on Mill Road has been refused on the same grounds, and being outside the village envelope.

Community Car Scheme - Bawdeswell, Bylaugh and Foxley

The car scheme continues to be extensively used by residents of the three villages, and in May enters its 5th year of availability. The scheme is restricted to medical appointments only to hospitals, doctors and dentists, and passengers pay 20p per mile, the rest of the cost being paid between the Parish Councils and Breckland.

Although there are six drivers who participate in the scheme and we hope to welcome one more driver from Foxley, they are all volunteers, and are sometimes unavailable because of illness or holiday arrangements. It would be very nice if we could add to the list of drivers, so if there is anyone who could spare a few hours and has a car available, why not find out more about this invaluable scheme? The paperwork involves having a valid driving licence, insurance, and a CRB check, which is paid for by Breckland. The Parish Clerk, Helen Moore, collates this information and ensures that all is in order.

I have to thank the present drivers, who are always willing and cheerful, and also the regular passengers for their understanding if we have a shortage of drivers, or the weather is too bad in the interests of everyone's safety to make a journey. We try very hard to give the villages a service so far unobtainable by bus.

BAWDESWELL PARISH COUNCIL

DIGEST OF THE MEETING HELD ON MONDAY 4th FEBRUARY 2013, at 7.30pm

<u>Present</u>: Councillors: Shannon DS (Chairman), Mason WM (Vice Chairman), Kirby AK, Lilwall JL, Mallen JM, Mr G Bambridge (District Councillor), Mr B Borrett (County Councillor) and Mrs H Moore (Clerk) + 9 parishioners.

Ongoing Issues from Previous Meetings

Possible Pedestrian Access to Bawdeswell Heath: Detailed assessments from Highways had revealed that a Trod (maintained natural surface) path along Dereham Road would cost £7,700 and a similar path along Billingford Road about £1,500. Match funding, possibly covering up to 75% of the costs, could be applied for with the NCC. Highways suggested keeping both possible routes within the initial application, but noted that if Dereham Road were to be a chosen route then the hedges would need to be cut back further than they are generally. AK will consult with the landowner regarding hedge cutting and would circulate a new business plan and an associated matched funding application prior to the next meeting. Folland Court:

Copies of the Register of Title and Plan related to the Folland Court Jubilee Garden had been received via email, indicating the transfer was now complete. However, there is an apparent discrepancy between the plan received and PC expectations on the land to be transferred. The Solicitor and Clerk are looking to resolve this with Land Registry.

Possible Work on Churchyard Trees: The cost of a full tree survey would be about £300, excluding the cost of any subsequent work. However, while there is a clear need to remove some dead branches and to clear ivy around the trees, the need for a full survey and other major tree surgery work had not been established. WM agreed to consult with the PCC to ensure that it would be content for minor works to go ahead, and the Clerk will seek any necessary permission from BDC for minor work given that the trees are within the Conservation Area.

Emergency Plan: The draft Plan, which had been formulated by the local coordinator Dan Taylor in conjunction with the Breckland Emergency Planning Officer, was fully endorsed by the PC, and a special note of thanks was given to Dan Taylor for all his hard work. BDC will now offer local maps and an emergency box for the Village Hall containing lights, radios etc. Area Wardens were now required to help with the implementation of the Plan, but potentially these roles could be associated with the required additional Home Watch officers. There is a seminar being held by BDC on the 27th March regarding Emergency Planning – DS and/or Dan Taylor will try to attend. A version of the plan that does not contain individual's names will be uploaded to the village website.

Bus Services To/From Bawdeswell: In attendance were two representative of NCC Transport. In opening the discussion and welcoming the representatives, Liz Edwards and Sean Asplin, DS explained that, while the village had the benefit of a well-utilised X29 Norwich to Fakenham bus service, there was a crucial need for a regular north/south service between Reepham. Bawdeswell and Dereham, given that Bawdeswell parishioners either needed access to medical services in Reepham and/or North Elmham and its satellite centre in Swanton Morley. While the village did have a thriving and well-utilised community car service, this could only be used for medical-related journeys where no alternative transport was available. Moreover, while access to Norwich and Fakenham was readily available during the day, there was no late evening X29 service, and parishioners, particularly the young and elderly, wanted/needed access to the shopping and social activities in Bawdeswell's 2 adjacent market centres. These needs, which had been well established in past and very recent village surveys, had seemingly been accepted by NCC officials, but previous efforts to establish a Foulsham/Bawdeswell/Dereham feeder service or a dial-a-ride service to meet these needs had apparently failed. If the seemingly under-utilised Konnect 04 service, which currently runs between the N&N Hospital, Dereham and Swanton Morley, could be extended by 2.5 miles to Bawdeswell it would access 850 potential users in Bawdeswell, and would offer these passengers easy access to other bus services passing through Dereham. Bearing in mind that other local villages (Billingford, Elsing, Lyng, Sparham) also suffered from minimal bus services, GB pointed out that if the 04

service were extended to include Lyng and Sparham etc there would be an additional 1000+ potential user market. JM suggested that, to ease the cost penalties, maybe the 04 service would not need to be extended on every run, perhaps just alternate ones. Mr Asplin responded that NCC officials had championed the idea of a Foulsham feeder service, but this had failed because a lack of support from Foulsham. Moreover, his evidence suggested that the existing weekly market day services to Dereham were not well-utilised. The current financial situation would also preclude any new feeder or dial-a-ride service, and any additional service would probably need to be subsidised by the NCC due to the number of bus pass holders likely to use the service. NCC officials were also wary of introducing any trial service only to withdraw it later. However, Mr Asplin saw the efficacy of an extension of the 04 service and would therefore consult with Konnect Buses about the associated business case and would report back to the Clerk.

Other Business of Interest to Parishioners

Village Hall: JL reported that the VH Committee was now well established with all duties covered. Following on from the recent Police Report and PC allocation of funds in FY13/14 towards VH security. research was now being carried out into equipment and costs that will enhance security and the user experience of the Village Hall. Options are also being looked at to incorporate and fund the driveway and car park into the plans for the new hall. The new VH constitution, which is vital for the Lottery funding application, was proving to be a major task, but it would hopefully be circulated to the PC in advance of the March meeting for endorsement at that meeting. Congratulations were due to all concerned for a successful outcome to Stage 1 of the Lottery Application. Stage 2, relating to the funding of the new hall, would now be submitted by 11th April. Should the Lottery funding application be successful, an extra £130k would be required to finish the project, and the Lottery Commission will need to know where these additional funds, in the form of a loan, will come from. The Clerk will investigate possible options for the PC to assist with the additional funding required, for discussion at the next meeting. A date for an open meeting on the new hall in the March/April timeframe would be established shortly. DS noted that the PC was responsible for necessary repairs to the fencing along the driveway of the Recreation Ground and for the establishment of low fencing around the car park to prevent cars and scooters accessing the sports fields, as advocated in the Police Report. The advice of a local fencing contractor would be sought prior to the next meeting. GB reported that Bawdeswell had been removed from the Police priority list due to the absence of ASB reports in recent weeks. However, DS noted that the Clerk had received a letter from parishioners who had recently been victims of harassment by youths in the village; but the Police had apparently dealt with the offenders.

FOXLEY WEATHER by Chris Bell

The weather during the month of January could be split into 3 parts. The first 8 days of the month were relatively mild and breezy with 3 of those days reaching above 10C. The highest pressure was also during this period, on the 4^{th} (1035mb).

However, January will likely be remembered 'weather-wise' for the cold snap that began with the passing of a cold front that brought the month's first frost. This was on the night of the 9th, and then on the 14th an occluded front moved across the region from the northwest and brought with it a spell of heavy snow between 4pm and 11pm, which accumulated to 17cm (6.6 inches) in Foxley during that 7-hour period. Snow-covered ground remained for the next fortnight, with another 6cm of snow falling around mid-day on Tuesday the 15th. This brought much of Norfolk to a standstill. That night, with light winds, clear skies and fresh snow-cover temperatures also fell to a remarkably low -12.8C (9F), which was the coldest temperature of the month. Further snow also fell on the 18th (2cm), 20th (6cm) and 25th (2cm), before milder air and rain allowed for a thaw on the 26th.

After the 26th the weather remained mild, wet and windy. The lowest pressure was recorded on the 27th (988mb), and the highest temperature was recorded during the afternoon of the 29th, 13.6C (56F). Rain was also recorded on all of these final 6 days.

This January was slightly colder than average, and wetter than average (with about 116% of average precipitation).

This weather data is collected by a Davis Vantage Pro 2 weather station located in Foxley. The data can be accessed live on the internet at: www.stormbell.net/weather





New Archbishop of Canterbury to visit Norwich



The Most Revd Justin Welby, the new Archbishop of Canterbury, is to spend the day in **Norwich on Thursday 14th March** on the first of a five day pilgrimage around the Province of Canterbury in the lead up to his enthronement at Canterbury Cathedral on Thursday 21st March.

The Archbishop is inviting as many people as possible to join him on this "Journey of Prayer". After a service of Holy Communion with the Bishop of Norwich and the Bishop's Staff team, the Archbishop will begin his pilgrimage in Norwich at the Forum where he will lead prayers at 11.45am., he will then walk to Norwich Cathedral, giving out candles to members of the public along the way, and inviting all who wish to do so to join him in prayer at the Cathedral.

From 12 noon to 5.30pm, the Archbishop will be praying in the Cathedral, and there will be several different prayer "stations" for anyone who so wishes to use. These will include a children's prayer space, which schools will be invited to visit; a prayer tree where prayers can be written, prayed and hung on the tree; a prayer map and globe to include prayers for the world-wide Anglican Communion; prayer through text messages; icons and candles; and music. The Archbishop's pilgrimage will conclude with Choral Evensong at 5.30pm before setting off to Coventry.

The Bishop of Norwich, the Rt Revd Graham James, said, "I'm delighted the Archbishop of Canterbury has decided to prepare for the start of his public ministry with a prayer pilgrimage, and that he has chosen to begin in Norwich. It will be very good to pray with and for Archbishop Justin and ask God to bless and strengthen him in his new responsibilities. Thursday March 14th will be a special day for the city, cathedral and diocese. Nothing quite like it has happened before, and we are busily preparing to make it special. Everyone who wants to support our new Archbishop will be very welcome."

The five day pilgrimage will embrace Norwich, Coventry, London, Truro and Chichester.

Dear Everybody, hello again.

Something has gone terribly wrong when a woman who is acting as a witness in a sex abuse case commits suicide because of the way she is cross-questioned. Frances Andrade had suffered the abuse thirty years before, but the damage and the mental scars had remained with her all that time. It lived with her.

One of the reasons that child abuse is so horrific to most people is that they know the damage never really goes away. Victims of abuse may learn to live with their past, but parts of that past will always be alive in the present. It is as ever-present as an amputation or as living with grief after the death of a spouse.

When people are damaged, it does help if they receive an apology. But it is obviously better if those things had never been done in the first place, if nobody had been hurt or damaged. If an NHS Trust damages its patients, we want to know that they won't do it again. An admission that something was wrong goes some way towards our believing that people intend to put it right.

But doing bad things and then saying sorry is not enough. In the Christian tradition, making restitution to those we have damaged is as important as forgiveness. If it is in our power to undo the damage, we should. In Lent, Christians should think both about what they may have done wrong, and also what they can put right.

Sometimes the things we do wrong are so small individually, that we do not notice them or think of them as bad, but cumulatively they are. We understand this in relation to the environment: for instance, constant over-fishing may not be noticeable until suddenly the stock of a particular fish collapses. In our treatment of others, we may not see the cumulative damage of a steady drip of unthinking remarks or unkind jokes until the butt of these gets depression, or wisely, refuses to have anything to do with us. Sometimes rules help. We need to use the wisdom of others, as well as our own, to avoid doing damage to anyone.
