A successful Presentation was held on Thursday 17th October on the plans for the New Village Hall, and progress to date on the application to the Lottery. There was a good attendance and it

was great to be able to catch up with people before and afterwards. The plans were available for anyone to see and we were glad that people took the opportunity to look at them.

In the end it was quite a social evening. David Cockburn looked after all the technical stuff and Janet looked after the bar, which certainly added to the conviviality of the event! Many thanks to them both, and thank you too to all those who came and supported us. Four of us work in more or less isolation now putting together the information the Lottery requires, so it is good to have a gathering where information is shared and we are reminded of the reality of what the new facility, bringing with it all kinds of opportunities for the village, will mean in future.

For those of you who weren't able to attend the news is that we have now received the final plans from the architects and a computer generated image of the interior which we are very grateful to Simon Lindley for volunteering to produce. The two major documents that make up the Lottery Application – the Business Plan and Capital Project Delivery Plan are both drafted. The team will continue to meet to edit and reedit them and to provide the required appendices. We have received positive feedback from our Lottery supervisors on the drafts they have seen to date, so we are hopeful that we will be successful when the application finally goes before the Lottery panel. We have a 75% chance.

We have had to have a bat survey undertaken and their presence at some time has been found in the hall. We are awaiting a report on the actual findings. Planning permission states that we have to deal with them in a way in which Natural England approves. We have our fingers crossed that this is not going to add too much to the project.

Seeking grants and fundraising continues. Unfortunately the Norfolk Construction Fund on which we were relying has not re-launched yet. We are seeking other grants and hope that by the end of November we will have been successful, if only for small amounts. We will be looking at arranging more fundraising events, but if anyone has some brilliant idea for fundraising please share it with us!

Buy a Brick continues and we still have 2014 calendars for sale. They can be obtained at the Post Office or from Marietta Menzies 01362 688 400 – your friends and family will love them so don't miss out!

The VHMC is looking into alternative accommodation for users while construction is underway. The plan is that all users will continue to book in the normal way and a temporary site will be made available to them at the same cost, whether it is going to cost more or not.

BOOK CLUB

The September read was The Paris Wife by Paula McLain.

Set in the 1920's The Paris Wife captures the life changing moment when Hadley Richardson meets Ernest Hemingway, becomes his first wife and sets up home with him in Paris at the height of the Jazz Age. A time fueled by fast living and hard drinking - something Hadley was ill prepared for and which was at odds with her conventional values and aspirations of being a traditional wife and mother . Meanwhile Ernest found himself at the centre of a circle of competing egos with other writers including F Scot Fitzgerald, Gertrude Stein and Ezra Pound.

The story documents the conception of Hemingway's novel The Sun Also Rises, which is based on this group of friends, and his eventual betrayal of Hadley.

The intensity of the hard living is well written but the group as a whole found the book lacking, possibly as it was not altogether clear which parts were fact and which fiction but try it yourself and see what you think. KG

BAWDESWELL PARISH COUNCIL DIGEST OF MINUTES OF THE MEETING HELD ON MONDAY 7th OCTOBER 2013 AT 7.30pmIN THE PORTACABIN - ADJOURNED & RECONVENED THURSDAY 10th OCTOBER 2013 AT 8pm IN THE PORTACABIN

Present: Councillors: Shannon DS (Chair), Mason WM (Vice Chair), Beane CB, Kirby AK, Lilwall, JL, Bambridge GB (District Councillor) and Mrs H Moore (Clerk) + 4 parishioners.

Ongoing issues from previous meetings: Planned footway to the Heath: Donations towards the contribution from the village (£3,700) are all in place, including the £200 allocated in the precept. Highways are poised to commence work this month, following PC consent. The works will take around 3 weeks to complete. All agreed to give the consent and also a huge thanks to AK for all her hard work. The work on Dereham Road will also improve drainage in the area as grips will be installed. Work needs to be done to clear hedges and verge areas. The farmer and Highways have offered help with this and also help will be sought from parishioners, via the Reeves Tale, and also from members of the Heath Trust. Highways will cut hedges bi-annually and cut the verges every six months. AK will talk to the landowner at the Heath boundary regarding his hedge line, as he previously indicated he was happy for this to be the stop/start point of the footway.

Bawdeswell Policy Statement on future development in the village: It is important to have clear statement in place, ahead of Breckland commencing their consultation which is likely to be in 2-3 months. There is a shortfall in the amount of land Breckland have allocated for development. The PC need to agree their statement and this will then be shared with parishioners, landowners, businesses and developers so that their comments and suggestions can be considered. A discussion was held to determine which areas of the village would be best suited to development. Factors considered were the conservation area, traffic congestion, infill and infrastructure. It was also noted that it is important to stress what is not wanted, i.e.cramming houses into the village. Issues such as sewerage and the school capacity will need to be solved to accommodate more houses in the village. DS will work on the draft statement and circulate to all Councillors ahead of the November meeting.

Recreation Ground closure - review of opening/closing times: Since the implementation of the closure, there have been no real problems and it seems to be working well. Highways have agreed to position a staggered barrier at the Saxon Meadows entrance. This will mean the recreation ground is still accessible by mobility scooters and bicycles. Highways have also given the PC permission to erect a gate at the Saxon Meadows entrance. It was agreed to give Highways the go ahead to erect a staggered barrier at the carriageway end of the entrance. Quotes will be sought for a gate and the situation re mopeds using this entrance will be monitored. It was decided that the closure times will be from 10pm to 7am, with immediate effect. AK will erect new notices giving the new times.

Street lighting: The Clerk informed the meeting of approximate costs of around £18 per street light for maintenance and repair costs, per year. This would not cover replacement so this would need to be considered in the precept for the next few years. The Clerk will seek quotes for a maintenance contract including replacement costs. DS will attend the forthcoming Breckland meeting to confirm with them that the PC will take on the ownership of the lights.

Any other business of interest to Parishioners: Parking in The Street & bus problems: Parking on The Street has caused problems for the buses, resulting in the bus having to reverse back out of the road on one occasion. A consequence of this is that the service has

changed and some go through Foulsham and not Bawdeswell. It is of great concern that it may lead to the loss of the service. It was decided that the Clerk write to the bus company explaining that the PC is unhappy with the change in the service and will do all it can to rectify the problem and invite them to help the PC seek a solution from Highways. The Clerk will also write to Highways and Bill Borrett to request yellow lines on one side of The Street to prevent parking. Recycling: A letter had been received from Breckland regarding the future of recycling. A new contract, commencing part way through 2014/15, has been agreed which will mean that glass and other recyclable materials will be collected from the home in the black bins. The bottle banks etc will remain at the Village Hall and credits for items recycled there will continue in the same manner as they do now.

Village Hall and Project Bawdeswell: The Lottery application for the new hall will, if successful, fund 75% of the costs of the project. As part of the application process, the Lottery need to know that the balance can be funded. The Village Hall Committee are still seeking other avenues of funding but this process takes time. Therefore, a proposal was put to the PC that they agree to apply for a loan to cover this shortfall. The loan repayments would equate to what the PC currently allocates in the precept to support the hall financially, therefore at no extra cost to the PC. As a worst case scenario, there may be other costs required. Therefore, the VHC asked the PC to agree to apply for a second loan to ensure funds are in place, should they be needed. It is difficult to know the actual cost of the project until tenders are in, in March 2014 but the Lottery need to see the money is in place by 18thDecember 2013. A motion detailing the proposed loans was agreed to and passed by the PC. WM, on behalf of the VHC, will draft a leaflet about the impact on the precept that will be distributed to all properties in the village. This draft will be put before the PC at the December meeting so that it is ready for distribution in the new year, once the next stage of the Lottery application has been decided. A request was also put forward to the PC that they give permission for a communications cable trench be dug in the soft ground next to the driveway to the village hall, across PC land. The PC agreed to this, providing that it is deep enough and adequate access is available to ensure that a footpath may be installed in the future. Permission is also required for a soakaway to be dug more or less in the land that is currently the car park but will become the landscaped area between the hall and the children's play area. The PC agreed to this request.

Planning Applications - i) Application to NCC to stop up (remove highway rights over) a section of the B1145 Norwich Road at Bawdeswell. The land in question is the area currently used for parking, opposite the garden centre.

If this application is approved, it will mean the land reverts to private land and can then be sold and NCC's intention is to sell it to the garden centre. The PC decided that whilst they are not qualified to comment on what is a highways matter they wish to be consulted on the future sale of the land as it would be appropriate for it to be donated to the PC for the benefit of the village. ii) Application 3PL/2013/0894/F for two new dwellings with garages at 4 Saxon Meadows. The PC decided that they are not in favour of this application as it suggests garden infill which is against Breckland policy with which the PC agrees.



WENSUM VALLEY BIRDWATCHING SOCIETY

This summer was wonderful on the whole, but occasionally it produced some very severe weather. So the torrential rain on the morning of 24th August no doubt deterred some members from joining the walk at Snettisham. However by the time the hardy few set out from the car park it was in only light rain. As they headed for the RSPB hides, whimbrel flew overhead and a large flock of black-tailed godwits headed onto nearby farmland. As the tide raced in, huge flocks of knot, godwits, dunlin and oystercatchers took to the skies, swirling and swooping up and down towards the roost on the lagoon. Once settled in the far hide, the group noticed that the far bank was smothered, unusually, in a single species. Hundreds of oystercatchers, spaced comfortably apart had the space all to themselves. A green sandpiper created some excitement, and was followed by a spotted redshank and a greenshank.

As the light rain showers subsided and the air warmed up so did the mammals and a stoat, a fox and a hare were seen. Walking the path around the surrounding grassland there were close views of a large flock of black-tailed godwits, and a group of common sandpipers added to the wader list. The highlight of the morning walk was the dark cloud of tens of thousands of knot streaming directly overhead as they returned to the sands as the tide receded.

Six remaining members enjoyed a warm afternoon at Titchwell with brighter skies and excellent views of ruff, golden plover, curlew sandpiper, little stint and guaranteed marsh harriers bringing the day's total to 66 species. It just goes to show that fortune favours the brave!



But our ability to pay our share of clergy and support costs depends on regular giving, donations and collections at services. This year we are paying nearly £11,500 (£220 each week) and next year we hope to be able to pay as much as £14,500 (£280 per week). It is wonderful that we are able to raise such sums each year.

The saints of Bawdeswell should be happy to see their work continuing.

From the Rector

Dear Everybody, hello again.

I was upset to hear on the news about the fake ceremonies in the United States, purporting to be the actual repatriation of dead servicemen from Korea, but which were just staged. I was even more upset to hear that a chaplain had been involved in the deception. It may have been intended to bring comfort to people, but now that it's been exposed, it makes things far, far worse for those who thought the whole event was real.

There's a saying: "The first casualty of war is truth". I googled it. People on the internet can't agree about the truth of where the saying comes from, which is ironic. But the reason that the saying is so often quoted is that it seems to coincide with our experience. In war, lies and deceptions are a tactical weapon; things bad for morale are "spun"; some truths must be kept secret for operational reasons.

I wonder, though, whether war can ever happen unless truth is already a casualty. The lies usually start quite a long time before; public opinion is already being softened up by the "war of words". Propaganda and prejudice demonise potential opponents. Telling the truth can be a force for peace, if it is used for that purpose.

We are living in a changing world. Warfare is no longer just states declaring war on other states; it's individuals declaring war on their host communities, or terrorists exporting themselves to different hotspots round the world. The recent exposure of tens of thousands of this country's secret documents does raise the question: "What happens if we want peace, but someone else wants war?" Does exposing abuses of trust justify risking people and operations? Can we be selective?

This will be the last Remembrance Day before 2014 and all the commemorations of World War I. Some of us will learn a lot through the press, TV, internet, and events. Some of us will think: "History is written by the victors", and be unconvinced by anything we hear. The truth we do know, though, is the evidence of our war memorials, the photographs of people who didn't come back, the stories that come from within our families and communities. Remember the dead, the cost in human lives, the suffering, the truth about war itself.
