Chaucer may not be alive and well but his memory lives on at Bawdeswell.

The village's new sign, designed by schoolboy Mark Fairhurst, shows Chaucer's reeve, who came from the village, stopping at nearby Balder's Well.

Mark, 15, won £5 in the competition, organised by Mr. Trevor Steward, one of his teachers at Reepham High School, and also unveiled the sign at a ceremony attended by parish councillors, villagers, and the signmaker, Mr. Harry Carter.

Bawdeswell's sign marks the end of an era with Mr. Carter, who has made signs for villages all over Norfolk saying it is definitely his last.

Parish council chairman, Mr. John Ames, said that there were about half-a-dozen designs submitted. "Mark's was the best one which covered the historical background of Bawdeswell," he said.

Then at the Chairman's request the Clerk, Mr. Charles Sparkes, gave details concerning its design. i.e. the Reeves on horseback linked with Chaucer's Uncle who was the Reeve for the area, and Bolder's Well, which is apparently linked with the Anglo Saxon 'The Beautiful Well, or Water.
